THE ordinance introduced at last night's council meeting, providing for the enforcement of the state prohibition law by the city authorities, has been embellished with some purely local provisions, until bootlegging will be a very hazardous and unprofitable practice, should the ordinance be passed.

The city will in this way be empowered to take action in the case of alleged violations of the dry law. This is a matter city officials have wished to take up in the past few weeks, but they have been handicapped by the lack of an ordinance under which to proceed. There has been a tendency on the part of some of the county officials to pay no attention to information regarding bootlegging, and the city therefore seeks power to issue its own complaints, etc., and take up this law enforcement for the sake of decency.

PETE, HE BELIEVES in preparedness. Yesterday he hooked his overcoat because he wanted to be prepared for a hot summer.

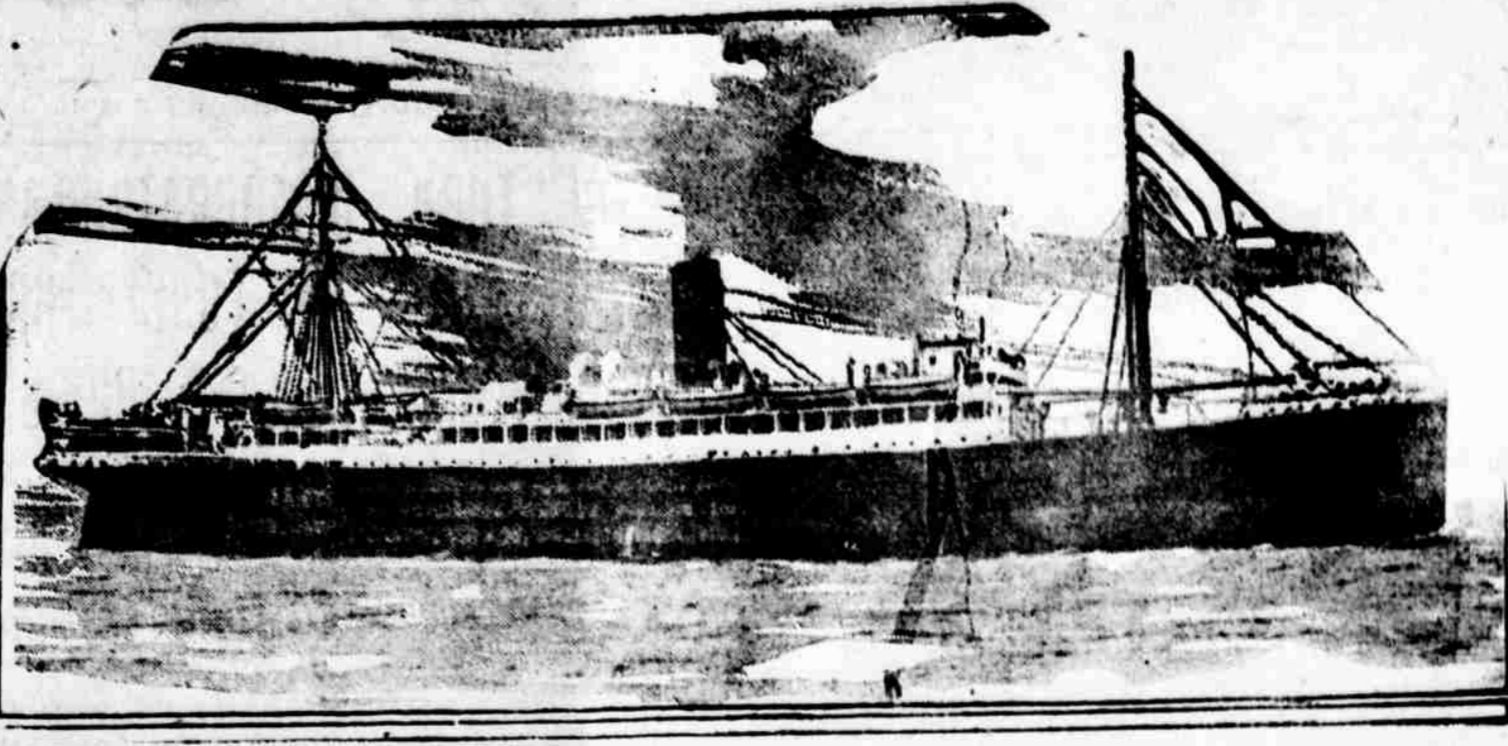

British Liner Taken Into Norfolk by German Crew



No exploit of the German navy has been more daring than the capture of the British liner Appam, bound from French Senegal, in Africa, to England. She was taken by an armed merchantman off the African coast. The British crew was overcome, and the vessel was sailed clear across the Atlantic to Norfolk. In the meantime the British owners believed the vessel had been sunk in a storm.

Tax Commission Explains New Law in Communication to All Collectors

Taxes Become Due in Two Payments, and Interest Charges Depend Upon the Date of First Payment

SALEM, Feb. 8.—The state tax commission has issued a letter to tax collectors, assessors and all others interested, explaining the sections relating to the time when taxes shall be paid, when delinquent and other features of interest.

"Taxes become payable in two separate installments," says the letter, in part. "If the first half is not paid by April 5th, interest is charged thereon (but not on the second half) at the rate of 1 per cent for each month or fraction of a month until paid. If the second half is not paid by October 5, interest then begins thereon at the same rate. No rebate or discount is allowed for advance payment of either installment.

"All taxes not paid in full on or before October 5 become delinquent. After said date and until the taxes are paid, or certificate of delinquency

is issued, interest continues to run at the rate of 1 per cent for each month or fraction of a month. Delinquent taxes not paid before November 5 are on that date subject to a penalty of 5 per cent, in addition to the interest specified.

"For illustration, we will assume that the taxes on a certain property, as charged on the roll total \$100:

The first half (\$50) may be paid on or before April 5, and the second half (\$50) on or before October 5, without interest or penalty on either amount; but,

"If said first half is paid on any day from April 6 to May 5, both dates inclusive, there should be added an interest charge of 1 per cent (50c); from May 6 to June 5, inclusive, 2 per cent (\$1); from June 6 to July 5 inclusive, 3 per cent (\$1.50); from July 6 to August 5 inclusive, 4 per cent (\$2); from August 6 to September 5

inclusive, 5 per cent (\$2.50); from September 6 to October 5 inclusive, 6 per cent (\$3).

"If the entire tax of \$100 is paid on any day from October 6 to November 4 inclusive, the interest charges should be 7 per cent on the first half (\$3.50) and 1 per cent on the second half (50c).

"If the entire amount is paid on November 5, the interest charges should be 7 per cent on the first half (\$3.50) and 1 per cent on the second half (50c), plus a penalty of 5 per cent, (\$5).

Interest continues on all delinquent taxes at said rate of 1 per cent for each month or part of a month, until payment or the issuance of a certificate of delinquency.

"All interest and penalties go to the county, and no part thereof to any municipal corporation or district for which taxes are collected."

Million Auto Sales Are Expected Next Summer

DETROIT, Mich., Feb. 8.—More than 1,000,000 American citizens will buy automobiles in 1916, according to the estimates of Detroit manufacturers who have made preparations to supply at least 550,000 of the total number. Detroit's automobile output last year was 425,000 cars, valued at \$400,000,000.

Detroit auto makers are gambling on dollars in real money they have put into new buildings and machinery and the employment of thousands of additional men to handle the increased business.

More than 75,000 men now are employed in the automobile industry

here. This number is steadily increasing. The average number of auto employes throughout 1915 was about 60,000.

Auto prices will not be lowered much during this year, local manufacturers declare. In fact, some of them predict a slight increase. The average price of all pleasure automobiles sold in the United States during 1915 was \$672. Eight years ago the average price was \$2,123.

Statistics compiled by manufacturers here show that the proportion of automobiles to the population of the United States is 1 to 48. For every mile of road in the country, there is one motor vehicle, according to these statistics.
