

Horses Enough to Supply Armies for Five Years

CHICAGO, Feb. 8.—The most tranquil war market is located here. It is the horse ring at the Union stock yards. There is practically no competition. German agents have given up attempts to boost the prices of horses because of the British blockade. At present France and Italy are the only ones doing any buying. The French agents purchase an average of about 400 horses a day. It is estimated that more than 2,000 horses are purchased daily throughout the country by agents of the allies. Horses bought here are shipped to

Crestline, Ill., twenty-five miles from here, where they are quartered until there are enough to make a train load. Then they are shipped to Portland, Me., or Jersey City, N. J., from whence they are shipped abroad.

According to dealers, there are enough horses in the United States to supply the warring nations for the next five years without causing a scarcity. They say there are 7,000,000 horses in this country.

The standard price for cavalry horses is \$135, and for heavy artillery horses, \$160. Every horse sold out of the horse ring is branded with a serial mark as a means of identification.

PAVED ROADS ARE FIRST STEP IN OHIO'S MILITARY PREPAREDNESS



CLEVELAND, Feb. 7.—This is a gasoline war, according to the witness at the front, hence Uncle Sam's program of preparedness is a matter, to a certain extent, of trucks, of armored cars, of motor artillery and of roads on which to operate them.

Cleveland, which has given America its first permanent citizens' military training school, is also the center of the locality most admirably adapted for motor strategy.

Over 400 miles of rural brick roads radiate in all directions from Cleveland to the various smaller centers of northeastern Ohio. Interurban trucking over these roads has reached a status which would make possible the mobilization of war supplies with a minimum effort.

The importance of this lies in the fact that no European government has found it practicable to own all of the trucks in time of peace that are needed in war. They rely upon privately owned machines, going so far as to subsidize manufacturers and owners with the understanding that cars shall be made of a type easily adapted to war purposes.

Napoleon said that an army travels on its stomach, meaning that it could proceed only as fast as its supply trains. In the present war, however, the supply trains have had to wait for the soldiers more often than otherwise. The rapid advance of General von Kluck toward Paris and the equally facile retreat of the English, who avoided trap after trap, was due

to the motor truck and to the improvement of roads of northeastern France.

During the present war, also, the armored automobile has become a practical means of offense for the first time. For raiding, observation or the temporary obstruction of a bridge or pass, the quick moving auto with its steel protection, its machine gun turret and its device for shearing through wire entanglements, is rapidly taking place of cavalry.

The old fashioned gun carriage for field pieces has been largely replaced by an auto truck mounting, which makes artillery immensely more mobile than ever before.

Thousands of lives have been saved also by the rapid removal of wounded men to hospitals many miles from the front when, but for the motor vehicle, they would have languished for days upon the ground, or would have received hasty attention in crude field hospitals.

War traffic has been highly destructive of Europe's roads, many of which have been rebuilt time after time since the war started. The French

have realized that the typical French road was not ideal for heavy motor traffic, and immediately preceding the war were investigating the brick system of Ohio, but were unable to put their conclusions into effect as a war preparation. Actual maneuvers, planned for early spring, will further test the adaptability of this road system for war needs.

JUDGE LANDIS DISMISSES SUIT AGAINST ORGANIZED BALL UPON MOTION BY THE FEDERAL LEAGUE COUNCIL
