JAPANESE SAYS OUR STUDENTS ARE NOT COMPELLED TO WORK

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 8.—The trouble with your American student is that he does not learn how to work and save money while he is in school. For every single fellow who works his way through college, there are scores who are financed by their parents. They do not appreciate their education. It comes too "easy."

Such was the opinion of J. Sahiyama, president of Aoyama Students' association of Tokyo, who is founder of a school where every student attending works his way. He has been in America for two years studying American school methods and has just returned to Japan on the Shinyo Maru.

"What the Japanese schools need and what I noted more than anything else in the American school is the chance they give the child for play or athletics. I intend to introduce them on an elaborate scale in our school."

"In the Aoyama school, every student has to make his own way and pay for his own schooling and board. This is the reason why you will find the youngest Japanese unafraid of ordinary labor and why you Americans marvel at his industry. He also learns all this from school days."

JUDGE DREAMS OF DAY

WHEN BENCH IS PASSED

OAKLAND, Feb. 8.—From the superior bench Judge Frank Ogden Friday spoke wistfully of the day when, criminals having reformed, his job will be abolished forever, together with other legal authorities.

His remarks were addressed to H. B. Ray, a 32-year-old youth, after he had sentenced Ray to two and one-half years in San Quentin for passing a fictitious check. When arrested, Ray was on a parole from a four year San Quentin term for a similar offense.

"Judges, lawyers, district attorneys, policemen and preachers have to live off of labor instead of laboring productively themselves," said the judge, "merely because such people as you fight organized society. What a new world it would be when all of you cease violating the laws and court, police and church authorities and join the ranks of producers and laborers."

New Prohibition Law Is Drawn Up

(Continued from page 1)

In trials of persons arrested. The title summarizes the ordinance as follows:

"An ordinance relating to intoxicating liquor; prohibiting the manufacture and sale thereof except in certain cases, or any shift or device to that end; regulating the keeping, sale and disposition of alcohol by druggists and the administering of intoxicating liquor by physicians; prohibiting advertising or soliciting or taking orders therefor, its carriage to or possession at dances, dance halls or other public gatherings; and the maintaining of locker or club rooms where such liquor is kept for beverage purposes, declaring certain places and things to be nuisances and providing for their abatement and injunction; declaring the rights and responsibilities of owners of property in such cases and providing for search of premises and seizure and destruction of liquor and fixtures under certain circumstances; regulating the transporting and delivery of intoxicating liquor by common carriers, and prescribing their duties and collection for shipments of same; restricting the amount of shipment and receipts of intoxicating liquor in certain acts to be done by individuals and common carriers, and providing for penalties in violation thereof; prescribing the powers and duties of certain officers; providing for citizens employing associate counsel; for injunction to city courts in cases arising from this ordinance; for expenses incurred and for the disposition of moneys received; for preliminary examinations by city attorney, and the forms of procedure and rules of evidence in cases and proceedings under this ordinance; defining terms used herein; repealing all laws in conflict herewith and fixing penalties for violation hereof, and declaring an emergency."

police power, to enter buildings where liquor is said to be kept for sale, upon issuance of a search warrant by city authorities. Citizens are empowered to employ associate counsel for the prosecution of any case, and the objections, etc., of this counsel are to be given full consideration.

The knowledge that a lessee is using a building for sale of liquor is sufficient grounds for ejectment by the owner of the premises. In case of no action being taken by the owner after learning of such a violation, the owner is liable to prosecution as assisting in the crime, and subject to fine or imprisonment.

Liquor in lockers at club or lodge rooms is also under the ban. The use of more than one-half of one percent of alcohol in any beverage served at a public gathering is also considered unlawful under the terms of the ordinance.

In case a person is convicted three times of violating the terms of the ordinance, he will be considered a "persistent violator," and can be sentenced to three months at hard labor.
