DELAYS IN FREIGHT SERVICE

THERE is complaint this winter from many railroad lines about congested freight traffic. Many roads, particularly those centering in New York, are suffering from blockades due to insufficient terminals or truckage, heavy shipments of war supplies, grain, etc. This must be a handicap to the commercial efficiency and general prosperity of the whole country. A freight train is regarded by the general public as a go-as-you-please affair that can wait everyone's convenience and loaf along until other traffic is cleared up. To the traveler the freighter is a nuisance that should stand on the siding, where it belongs, and not obstruct passenger business. But for all the delayed travelers, there are as many people somewhere impatiently waiting for freight. Trade depends on regular merchandise shipments. Delays mean loss of customers, and irritating personal and business inconvenience. Exasperating delays occur in factory operation from delayed freight deliveries. While some little shipment of incidental material stands off on some remote siding, impossible to locate, workmen must lie off and manufacturers fail to keep promises. It is an intricate problem to operate passenger traffic safely through the tangle of freight business. The irritated traveler, fuming at delay, may well thank his stars that the engine-man's ambition to make time has not deposited him in the ditch. Of course prompt passenger service is very essential. Many roads have a chronic and slovenly habit of delay in passenger operation. But regular freight service is just as important. The business fabric will not run smoothly unless its material is promptly and regularly supplied. The country has grown fast, and the freight blockades of this winter have shown that railroad equipment has not kept pace.

IF GEORGE W. PERKINS and such progressives as he controls are really desirous of doing all that they honorably can to secure an identical candidate and platform for both republicans and progressives, we can not see why Mr. Perkins should not embody his action with as many resounding declarations of principles as he pleases. The main thing, the practical thing, is to unite all forces to rid the country of an administration which has, as Mr. Perkins says, brought so much discredit to the country.

City Held Not Liable for Injuries on Bad Walks

PORTLAND, Feb. 10.—The city cannot be held liable for injuries resulting from defective streets or sidewalks under a decision rendered by the supreme court in the suit of Anna Humphreys against the city of Portland. This means that the charter provision exempting the city from liability in such cases is valid. The woman was injured July 17, 1912, through an alleged defect in a sidewalk at East Glisan and East Twenty-ninth street. Suit was brought against the city council, the city engineer and the property holders abutting, and a judgment of \$3,000 against the city was awarded by the city circuit court. Deputy City Attorney Davie, representing the city, appealed to the supreme court, which resulted in reversal of the circuit court's decision. City Attorney La Roche is very much elated over the decision. He says that had the supreme court held that the city was liable in such case, his office force would have to be doubled to handle the damage suits which would follow. There are at present several similar suits, but because of the ruling of the supreme court these will probably not be pressed.

"Silent Assassin" of Albany and the Weapon He Used



Harold L. Severly, the "silent assassin" of Albany, who shot four persons before he was caught, is believed to be insane. The weapon is a Stevens single shot pocket rifle of 22-calibre, with a butt about ten inches long, which, with the silencer (arrow indicates silencer) attached made it about eighteen inches all told. There could be attached a skeleton detachable stock. He had attached the Maxim silencer to the end of the barrel and then rigged up a wire attachment at the end of the latter, which when pressed, would pull the trigger. His rigging up of the weapon was a clever idea. Two straps were attached to the rifle near the butt. These were put about the arm, and held the weapon so the end of the silencer came within about an inch of protruding from Severly's coat sleeve. He could walk along swinging his arm, raise it up, pull the little wire connecting the trigger, and the bullet would be on its way. He could only fire one shot at a time. To load the rifle again all Severly had to do was to take a cartridge from his pocket, put his hand in his coat as though to pull up his other shirt sleeve, insert the cartridge and cock the piece, which was then ready for execution at the pull of the wire attachment.
