THE GARRISON AFFAIR

THE entire nation is surprised today at the resignation of Secretary of War Garrison and Assistant Secretary Breckenridge last night, following a difference between Garrison and Wilson over the plans for army increase. Opinions commending Garrison are heard from many, the tenor of these being that he was the man selected to administer the affairs of the war department, and his recommendations should have been given more consideration; and that falling in this, he is justified in stepping down and out, leaving the work up to someone else in favor of Wilson's views.

Incidentally, this is the second resignation from the cabinet within eight months' time, coming as a result of differences of opinion with President Wilson. In the case of Bryan's resignation last June, the terms used in a rejoinder to Germany's reply in the Lusitania affair caused the split. So far, although repeated notes have been exchanged, and the affair has been "almost settled" many times, the Lusitania affair is as near ended today, apparently, as when Wilson took issue with Bryan's methods.

A PLEA FOR CHILDREN

THERE has never been a mother who has not yearned over the pure innocence of a little child, as she considers the dangers that beset the tiny soul. If we see life's values with courageous wisdom, we do not pray "Lead them not into temptation," but we beg for them the vision that is granted only to those who have kept their inner selves "unspotted before the world."

Over and over we ask ourselves, seeing about us those who have lost this blessedness, how we can arm them to this end. Every year we mothers see more clearly that to know life, and to know themselves as a part of life, is the only protection for our children. The old policy of ignorance has disproved itself uncounted times. With the very little ones, we may indeed ask ourselves, "Is it not wise to wait until this knowledge may come to them with complete significance?" But whatever answer we may make to that question, it is only in unusual instances of family isolation that such a policy can be maintained. There is no question but that they will be told. The only question is, "How and by whom are these things to be told them?"

It is in the first associations that the battle is often lost or won. The new word of knowledge, then, must begin in our homes, where the bonds of the family are the natural, living beginning of comprehension. Social hygiene societies should teach all of us mothers and fathers to realize this, and teach us how to make the growing knowledge a natural, tender, gradual initiation into the wonders of life, becoming deeper and clearer as the years bring our children to the threshold of their own experiences. They should teach us how to keep open, all this time between parent and child, the gateway of free and loving confidence.

These children, so prepared, will go into the schools and change the atmosphere of them from one which mothers dread and teachers struggle against, to the wholesomeness of the homes from which they come. They will be ready to co-ordinate the knowledge the schools give them as never before. And, later, they will go into their communities, not, indeed, protected from all the maladjustments, the difficulties and the pains that lie in wait for them, but with a fighting chance for a normal, open, clean-minded life, and a proud and joyful parenthood of their own—Mrs. Eric Allen in Bulletin of the Oregon Soul Hygiene Society.

The Austro-German soldiers are supplied with bludgeons, and on parts of the British front the ally soldiers have been furnished clubs covered with spikes. State Commissioners Do Not Agree With Interstate Railroad Valuations

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 11.—State public utilities commissions are going to establish a lookout bureau at Washington to keep close watch on developments in the valuations placed on railroads by the Interstate Commerce Commission.

Commissioners of state public service commissions in attendance at the Interstate Commerce Commission's hearings are sponsors for the lookout bureau. After presenting their arguments to the commission as to the method of conducting valuation proceedings, the commissioners expressed fear that methods unfavorable to them will be used.

One fear of the state commissioners is that the real estate of railroads, terminals and rights of way will be appraised at condemnation value. This would make a difference of about \$8,000,000,000 over the valuations as made by state commissions.

Some of the commissioners in attendance at the valuation hearings express fear that the Interstate Commission is hazy on the subject of valuation. Only two members, they allege, have had experience in valuation cases. They are Mr. Meyer and Mr. Daniels; and Daniels, the commissioners say, has had experience mostly with public utilities rather than railroads.

If the high valuation that would be made by following the carriers' the-

ories is adopted by the Interstate Commission, the state officials say government ownership would be the only thing and the most economic thing to resort to then. Appeal has been made to certain senators by commissioners. Senator Cumming was called into conference and asked to lead a possible fight.

Charles A. Prouty, former member of the Interstate Commission, is head of the valuation division which prepared the data for the commission to inaugurate its hearings upon. If the state commissioners do not have their way in determining methods of valuing, they threaten to seek abolition of the valuation division, or to ask that its appropriation be cut off.

If the valuation is made the railroads' way, allowing market or condemnation value, the carriers would naturally be given credit for higher assets than under the original cost or physical valuation method of the state bodies. In the instance of terminal and right of way property there would be a large appreciation in values since the land was acquired.

The state commissioners say that little attention has been paid by the Interstate Commission to the original cost or original values. Several state commissions have given much consideration to the original cost question.

With the raising of funds for the establishment of their lookout bureau the state commissioners will inaugurate a fight to have the valuation made according to their views.

Suffering of Stricken Jews Is Most Terrible

I. W. Hellman Jr., a member of the finance committee of the Jewish Relief Day executive committee, says:

"The condition of the Jews, especially in Poland, but also in the other parts of the war zone in Europe, beggars description. In Poland they have always been considered as an alien race. They have been driven before the army whenever the army advances in their direction.

"When the Russians commenced to retreat they attempted to follow the tactics of 1812, destroying all of the houses and driving the inhabitants, including the Jews, before them. Old and young, sick and well, were allowed to enter Russia. When the Jews reached the end of the pale they were driven back by the police onto the bayonets of the Russians. The consequence is, they have been treated as battledore and shuttlecock.

"Women who had just given birth to children were compelled to keep on marching.

The refugees had nothing to eat except a few potatoes, no place to sleep and no coverings. The conse-

quence is they have died, not by hundreds and thousands, but by the hundreds of thousands, and the lowest estimate is that of the 6,000,000 Jews who have been in Poland when the war broke out over 7 per cent are dead, including all of the children under 7 years of age.

"The only hope of assistance is from America, and we must help them. This is the first time in the history of the world that the Jews have ever called upon anybody to take care of their own people, but the task is beyond their strength and they must ask their fellow citizens to aid them."
