TWO WEAK MEN

BY THE mouth of that usually speechless gentleman, Senator Stone of Missouri, the president has caused it to be known that he does not want to intervene in Mexico for fear that such action would provoke a revolution which would result in Carranza's overthrow. Carranza, be it remembered, was recognized by Wilson on the ground that he was the strongest of the contending rivals in Mexico, and that he was most likely to be able to re-establish order in that unhappily distracted country. It now appears that Carranza is not only unable to maintain order and to protect foreign residents in Mexico, but that his hold upon authority is so slender that any outside menace against the marauding murderers whom he cannot control will cause a fatal revolt against the nominal Carranza government.

In choosing Carranza as the recipient of his latest and most generous favor to the warring Mexican chieftains whom he has embraced seemingly in rotation, Mr. Wilson has again demonstrated his exceptional inability to judge men; and as a result he finds himself loaded with the responsibility for Carranza—whom he cannot control, and whom he apparently does not dare to assist.

Here, too, the president displays once more a prominent defect—his reluctance or inability to face a disagreeable situation. Two courses are open to him, either of which would bring measurable relief to the intolerable conditions in Mexico. He can send our forces into the country for the protection of our people there, a course which he has formally told congress that he believes himself empowered to follow without legislative sanction. Or he could send our forces into Mexico to bolster up the Carranza government in exactly the same way our forces are now in Nicaragua maintaining in office a government which would not last over night were it not for the American marines who surround it.

Senator Stone's announcement of the president's position reveals two very weak men—Venustiano Carranza and Woodrow Wilson.

Speaking by Dumb Men Is One Miracle of War

ROME, Jan. 25.—(By mail)—Making the dumb to speak through mental suggestion and the power of will is one of the miracles almost daily being performed by Italian army surgeons. The well substantiated stories of what these men are doing rival the miraculous events chronicled in the Book of Books. The story of the Leazes and Fishes and the raising of Lazarus, the widow's son, from the dead, contain little more to marvel at than these every day battle front wonders of 1916.

Hypnotism and mental suggestion are being successfully employed by the surgeons of the Italian army in helping soldiers who have lost the

power of speech to recover that faculty. Experiments are also being made to see if the method cannot be employed with equal success on blind soldiers and deaf men. These experiments apply only to those cases where the nerves of sight and hearing have been shocked and not destroyed.

The first successful experiments with dumb soldiers were made in the military hospital at Ancona, but have since been repeated at Cava del Tirreni and elsewhere. Dr. Gustav Modena is the originator of the method. In his first successful application Dr. Modena had for his subject the soldiers Giuseppe Valeri and Nazareno Aquilini. Neither man had spoken a word for six months. The first day Dr. Modena subjected the men to an electrical current and to the mental suggestion that they must speak.

Twenty-four hours were allowed to elapse that this suggestion might

work in their minds. The second day the doctor again applied the current, and, ordering the patient to look him squarely in the eye, exerted all of his hypnotic and will power in imposing on his patient the command to speak.

Almost instantly Valeri, the first subject, began to mumble inarticulate sounds. A little later he formed the first two words every child speaks—mamma and babbo (papa)—and finally began speaking almost with the same degree of facility he had enjoyed previous to his injury at the front. Equal success was met with in the case of Aquilini, the second patient. The method now is generally employed in Italy.

Experiments looking toward the restoration of sight and hearing in the same way have not met with a full degree of success, but encouraging progress has been made.
