SAYS COTTON MEN
WANT CHILD WORK

CHAMPION OF CHILD LABOR SAYS
THE SOUTHERN MILL OWNERS
ARE MAKING A STRONG FIGHT
AGAINST HIM

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22.—Charg-
ing that Southern cotton mill inter-
ests are conspiring to kill the child
labor bill, Representative Keating of
Colorado, its author, today issued a
warning to the public and an appeal
to "write your congressman."
"The plan of the selfish interests is
to stave off action on the bill in the
senate until it will be sidetracked
by the preparedness program and put
over at least until next term," said
Keating. "The cotton mill inter-
ests hope to delay any action by the
senate interstate commerce commit-
tee, which is friendly to the legisla-
tion and reported it last session. They
propose to this end that the legisla-
tive committee visit the mill dis-
tricts."

"By holding up the bill in commit-
tee until the preparedness bills get
before the senate they plan to have
eight or ten Southern democratic sen-
ators then serve warning that they
will begin an endless filibuster against
the preparedness measures unless the
child labor bill is sidetracked for the
session. It is then hoped to sacri-
fice the child labor bill in the inter-
est of the preparedness program. The
people should know just what this
conspiracy is. They should write
their congressmen and senators. Sen-
ator Robinson of Arkansas, who is in
charge of the bill in the senate, is
friendly to the measure."

HAVE WE COME TO "NEAR" PLUM PUDDING?

DENVER, Colo., Feb. 22.—Colo-
rado kiddies are facing a crisis. The
old-fashioned luscious plum pudding
and the satisfying mince pie have
been banished from the state under
the new prohibition law that went in-
to effect on the first of the year.
Governor Carlson, in a public state-
ment, signed the death warrant of
these national dishes, introduced into
America by our Puritan ancestors.
The governor is upheld in his judg-
ment by Attorney General Farrar.
Their action is also justified by the
chemist. An analysis shows that the
ordinary plum pudding, such as the
corner grocer sells, contains 3.15 per

cent of alcohol and a trace of ethyl
alcohol—as much alcohol as beer con-
tains.

But the kiddies ignoring lawyers'
opinions and chemists' analysis, are
asking what Christmas will be like
next year without the usual double
portion of mince pie and plum pud-
ding. They even doubt whether Santa
Claus will visit Colorado at all be-
cause of the hateful decree.

On the other hand, an epidemic of
"melancholia infantis," the official
name for juvenile disappointment,
may be expected before Santa's next
annual visit. In that event physi-
cians may be writing prescriptions on
the nearest drug store for the cura-
tive plum pudding.

If all of these plans fail, there is
still a way out. Colorado offers all
the wealth that is stored in her hills
to the culinary genius who will in-
vent an acceptable substitute for the
good old-fashioned mince pie and
plum pudding. Prohibition has pro-
duced many strange concoctions, in-
toxicating medicinal "tonics," var-
ious caffeine stimulants at soda foun-
tains, and "near beer." Now enter
"near mince pie" and "near plum
pudding."

Unless something is done, Colo-
radoans say, old Saint Nicholas may
be driven a boot-legging in order to
insure the kiddies an old-fashioned
Christmas with pies and puddings of
"the kind that mother used to make."

The allied and neutral worlds were
the guests in the persons of about
forty correspondents from America,
France, Italy, Norway, Sweden, Den-
mark, Holland and Spain, besides a
number from England, Australia and
Canada.

Perhaps there was a German spy in
our midst, despite the care exercised
by the revolving chair warriors in
Whitehall in selecting the party's per-
sonnel. If so, probably he learned
some things, but there are a lot he
would like to learn that he didn't.
He surely must have been impressed
right at the start with the fact that
the British naval officer can be charm-
ingly courteous without being un-
duly communicative, and that the
British blue-jacket has been quite as
well drilled in controlling his tongue
as in manning his guns.

Another thing he must have learned
before the day was over, if he
didn't know it before, was that there
are no croakers among these sea-
fighters. The men of the Cat squad-
ron are the cheerfulest lot of Brit-
ishers I've met since the war started,
as well as among the hardest work-
ed. Upon the crews of these light
cruisers and speedy destroyers rests
a heavy responsibility. For seventeen
months they have been at this job
of guarding Britain from raid or in-
vasion. Steam is always up. They
are not only ready at an instant's
notice to pounce upon the enemy, but
they are constantly searching for
him. Some part of the Cat squadron
is always prowling about the North
Sea, nosing out submarines, fishing
for mines, annoying zeppelins, chas-
ing aeroplanes, or quietly rubbering
along the German coast.

They are too busy to grumble even
if they felt like it. Back in London
cabinet members were resigning;
labor was threatening to boycott the
war; politicians generally were mak-
ing a frightful fuss; the pessimists
were having the time of their lives
and even the dyed-in-the-wool opti-
mists were sadly shaking their heads.
But here all was peace and quiet and
cheerfulness and work. We talked
with men of all grades, from the
youthful-looking commodore to the
veteran officer, and politics wasn't men-
tioned once the whole day. They had
no curiosity as to what was going on
at Westminster. The overturning of
the government or even the abdic-
ation of the king would make no dif-
ference to them. Their work was out
when Winston Churchill, a week
before war was declared, started the
Grand fleet for the stations where it
would do the most good, and they are
going to keep right at the job until
the finish.

Concentrated efficiency, readiness
for any emergency, but above all the
breezy, boyish optimism of these sea-
fighters which the nervous strain of
constant vigilance or the down-beat-
edness of some of the folks back
home has failed to disturb in the
slightest degree—these are the im-
pressions one cannot fail to carry
away after a day spent with the Cat
squadron.
