THE COMMUNITY INSTITUTE

ONE of the many ill effects of the concentration of population and wealth in the industrial centers has been a corresponding concentration of the great educational institutions—universities, art galleries, museums and libraries. While much of the best in an educational way has its origin in the rural community, while many of the greatest educators, artists and inventors have been born and reared in the country and on the farm, they have found removal to the large centers convenient, if not necessary, to their higher development.

Perhaps this situation is unavoidable, but whether it is or not the rural communities are bound to do something to bring back to themselves the results and benefits to be derived from the progress that has been made in the arts and sciences in the great educational centers. They must open channels that shall connect them with the fountains of learning in order that all may be benefited, and be enabled to keep step in the march of intellectual progress.

Much has been done to take back to the farm and make practical the knowledge that has been developed at the agricultural experiment stations. The country schools have been improved through the medium of normal schools, and the law and medical schools have raised the practice of two great professions to higher planes. But there is much in the way of general progress that has not made its way into the rural communities as it should. Hence there are opportunities for the local organizations—community clubs—to bring to their people knowledge and mental stimulus of this sort through community institutes, such as that held at Merrill, Wisconsin.

The great subject of sanitation in all of its ramifications needs emphasis in rural communities; the care of the sick in the home, the prevention of the spread of contagious diseases, the adoption of sanitary conveniences, methods and equipment in the household and about the barns and outbuildings are subjects that may and should find places on institute programs alongside of discussions of farming methods. Home nursing is quite as important as domestic science proper. The protecting of the health and the preserving of the life of the farmer are not of less importance than the preservation of the soil; the bringing up of strong and vigorous youth is of greater importance than the improvement of live stock; though too often more attention is paid to the one than to the other. The community institute affords an opportunity to place these subjects in their proper relation.

War Purchases of Horses Take the Best From State

The large war orders for Oregon horses has not been altogether for the best interests of the horse business from the horse breeders' standpoint. Instead of taking the small, unsound and undesirable horses, buyers took only the very best. The result of this is that the very horses that have been sold are largely the ones that should have been used for breeding stock, and the smaller, inferior ones that breeders should have disposed of are now on hand for the foundation of future herds.

"Many people are asking what is to be done to improve these horses so that those who are in the business at the present time may stay in it and derive a satisfactory income from their investments," said Carl N. Kennedy, horse specialist of the Agricultural College. "The very first thing that will have to be done before advance is made in to replace the scrub stallion with a good pure bred stallion just as fast as it is possible. In the next place these stallions must be given better care and more feed during the winter.

"With sires such as are being used at the present time it cannot be expected that horses will be improved, since the sires themselves would scarcely make marketable geldings. We cannot get good, big, marketable horses from small, under-sized scrub stallions. As long as we use mongrel sires we will raise a class of horses which will not only be hard to sell at a profit but hard to sell at any price.

"With the advent of the auto and other forms of gas power times are changing and there is not now the demand and use of certain kinds of light horses that there has been in the past. To meet these changes conditions horsemen must change their method of breeding and raise what the market calls for."

Lane's Indian Bill Gives Reds Complete Freedom

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 23.—Indian chieftains met in council here not long ago. There were Blackfeet, Osages and representatives of other tribes, and the result was a bill which has been introduced in the senate by Lane of Oregon, who takes particular interest in the affairs of the red man.

Senator Lane also helped in framing the bill, with the assistance of several Indian lawyers, but he gives first credit for the measure to the Indians themselves. It is their bill, he says, and he is standing with them.

It is no half-way measure. In its first lines it wipes out the present Indian bureau, including about 8,000 employees. It is a bill to free the Indian, or, quoting the title, "for the abolishment of the Indian bureau, the closing out of Indian tribal organizations and for other purposes."

"It would make a clean sweep," says Senator Lane. "It proposes to make the Indian a citizen and allow him to act for himself. The only way to remove the Indian from his position of dependency and save him from further abuse and despoliation is to wipe out the Indian bureau. The Indians own over a billion dollars' worth of property, but the law makes them incompetent and their property is at the whim of government officials. Large numbers of them are just as competent as you or I, and this condition ought to end."

It was suggested that two United States senators, Curtis of Kansas and Owen of Oklahoma, are of Indian blood, and the Oregon senator was asked if they will support the plan proposed by the bill.

"Probably not," was the reply. Senator Lane refused to comment as to the reasons why they will not join him in the legislation proposed by the Indian "council of war," but he said he expects substantial support from other sources.

Under the Lane bill a new bureau of three commissioners, selected by the Indians themselves, would be placed in control of Indian affairs. Indian tribes and bands throughout the United States would be called in council to select delegates to a grand council, each tribe or band of over 1,000 members to select three delegates, while those with 500 to 1,000 members would have two delegates, and the smaller tribes one delegate each.

The president would select, subject to approval by the senate, three commissioners out of a list of five candidates nominated by this grand council of the Indians.

The new commission would then proceed to the "complete emancipation" of the Indians from the government control and supervision, and all who have not received allotments would be declared citizens, with freedom to do as they pleased with their property.
