GET RIGHT ON IT

THIS IS Pay-Up Week. Don't take it lightly. In one of the Pay-Up Week campaigns in a Western city an ordinary silver dollar was labeled "The Home Dollar." Everybody was asked to keep it moving, not to send it out of town, and to report to whom he paid it. Everybody was surprised how busy that little round dollar was. It paid hundreds of dollar debts and finally got back where it started. If one dollar kept in circulation at home can do so much for a community, what if all the dollars are kept busy that way? Think it over.

If you have \$50 in your pocket and you owe \$50, you know that the \$50 you have in your pocket is not rightfully yours. If you cannot afford to pay all of the \$50 that you owe, at least pay part of it. If you think that when you have money you owe you have a right to retain it until you are good and ready to pay, men who owe you money have a right to think the same way.

It is this general proposition that Pay-Up Week seeks to remedy. If you promise a merchant, if you promise a friend, to make good a certain sum on a certain date, you should mean what you say. A man who would not think of breaking a social engagement will break a financial engagement or promise and think nothing of it. For years it has been considered all right to take your time paying a debt.

This theory is all wrong. Pay-Up Week is a start in a general remedial plan. If worked out properly it will prove one of the best things that this community ever has had.

"BETTER BABIES FOR OUR TOWN"

Hartsmannswillerkopf Fighting, Though Fierce Is Unimportant

Hill of Vosges Is of No Advantage, Yet It Has Been the Scene of Some of the War's Most Desperate Fighting

WITH THE FRENCH ARMY IN ALSACE, Jan. 20.—(By mail).—A feud in the middle of a big war, that is what this position of Hartsmannswillerkopf is; a feud just like they have down in Breathitt county, Kentucky. For French officers will admit and so will German officers, that this position on the western battle front has no more and no less importance than scores of other points elsewhere between the sea and Switzerland.

Every few days the French and German communiques mention scrapping on the knob in the Vosges mountains known as "Old Armand," or Hartsmannswillerkopf. One might imagine that the side holding this crest held the key to Paris or to Berlin. It is not so. It is simply the feud going on, each side determined to have the honor of holding the top of the mountain. It is like the struggle about a flag; a matter of pride in taking and holding.

The quarrel began exactly a year ago. A small detachment of French chasseurs established an advance post on the summit of Hartsmannswillerkopf. They were surprised by a much larger force, surrounded and beaten. This was on January 15, 1915.

Fortifying the position strongly as an observation point, the Germans held the crest until March 23, when the French stormed the hill, took the trenches at the top, captured ten officers and 313 men, all unwounded.

Early in April the Germans recaptured part of the lost trenches, but the French, on April 6, charged once more, took all they had lost, together with the big rock on the far side of the summit.

Humiliated, the Germans prepared a counter attack which they launched April 26, taking everything back to and including the summit where they feverishly set to work organizing the position so it would be stronger than ever. All night they worked, but with the dawn of day came the "blue devils," as the Alpine chasseurs are called, swarming up the precipitous slopes of "Old Armand," and despite machine guns, rifle fire and bayonets, they reached the top and put the Germans to rout once more. Immediately the Germans tried to rally but failed, though they made headquarters in trenches within seven yards of those of the French at the top.

Throughout the summer the little war in the middle of the big war kept going, first the Germans gaining a section of trench at this point or that, then the French driving them out and taking a corresponding slice of the German trenches a bit lower down the slope.

On September 9th, the Germans, after a period of comparative calm, slammed home a surprise attack and retook the summit. The French, undismayed, came back at the Germans the same night and in the dark fought like the blue demons people call them. They retook their trenches and many German dead were left behind.

The same thing happened all over again October 15, when the Kaiser's

men sent wave after wave against the bitterly contested mountain top, finally taking the whole works, driving the French back down the hill in the direction of France. But on October 16, the French came tearing up the hill again and drove the Germans out.

The Germans came back in December several times, gaining a foothold, but just before Christmas the French drove them back with heavy losses, including nearly 1,400 prisoners. Two days later the Germans retook part of the lost ground and some French prisoners. Then the French surged forward, making new gains and taking about 300 more prisoners.

So the struggle for the top of the mountain goes on. To hold it is an honor. To win this honor many and many soldiers have died. To the layman their death may seem vain, foolish, useless, but to the soldier not a drop of blood has been wasted. For in war, victory or defeat depends largely on what the French call "moral," and to hold the top of Hartsmannswillerkopf helps the moral of the whole army of the Vosges.
