WILSON AND DANIELS

"AND IT ought, in my judgment,
to be incomparably the great-
est navy in the world."

So spoke President Wilson at St.
Louis, in discussing the sea arm of
our national defense.

Coincidentally with this Admiral
Strauss, chief of the bureau of or-
nance in the navy department, was
testifying before a committee of con-
gress and was admitting with reluc-
tance that Secretary Daniels had cut
\$12,000,000 from the estimates made
by the department's experts—and
this without consulting anyone. The
reduction which Mr. Daniels made
came chiefly in the item of ammuni-
tion and in the item for anti-aircraft
guns, with which the experts planned
to defend isolated radio stations and
the like from their most dangerous
and insidious enemy.

This is not the way to procure an
incomparably greatest navy. And if
Mr. Wilson's judgment is to prevail
it is evident that radical changes will
have to occur in the navy department.
The shortest cut to such reform, and
the most effective remedy would be to
dismiss Secretary Daniels. Such ac-
tion would afford convincing proof
that the president is in earnest in his
judgment as to what the navy should
be.

The Better Babies Health Exhibit,
to be given at the council chamber at
the city hall Thursday and Friday un-
der the auspices of the Civic Depart-
ment of the Woman's Library Club is
an affair which is attracting much in-
terest. The better babies campaign
is spreading rapidly over the country,
and Klamath Falls has adopted the
plan with the following slogan: "Bet-
ter Babies for our town." Local phys-
icians and nurses have taken an
active interest in the work, and all of
the children between 6 and 60 months
old entered will be studied and
scored, these scorings being given the
parents for their guidance. This is
to be in the nature of an exhibit, and
there will be no prizes. Helpful lec-
tures and demonstrations regarding
the care of the little ones will be part
of the program each day, which all
are invited to attend. The Better
Babies Health Exhibit is a popular,
yet scientific, movement to insure bet-
ter babies and a better race. It con-
sists of entering, examining children
of five years or less on exactly the
same basic principles that are ap-
plied to livestock shows. Mere beau-
ty does not count. Physical and men-
tal development only are considered.

The Better Babies Exhibit insures a
better race of Americans, because it
teaches parents how to improve the
physical condition of children already
born and to protect those yet unborn.
It arouses interest in the conservation
of child life and health, and in all
forms of child welfare. It forges a
connecting link between parents and
teachers, between the home and the
scientific study of child life. It pro-
motes civic interest in children of the
community.

One of the most pleasant and most

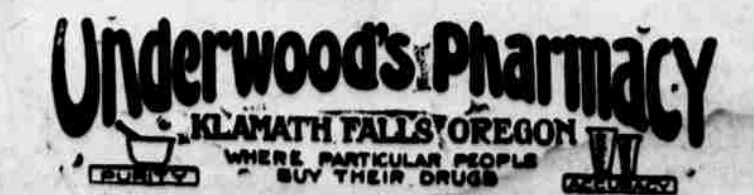
