THAT TREE CAMPAIGN

THE MOVEMENT started by the Commercial Club for the planting of trees throughout Klamath Falls, especially along the street parkings, is one that should be supported by all. Beautifying our town is a necessary work, if we seek to make a proper impression upon visitors.

Klamath Falls is an infant, compared with the ages of other cities, and the tree planting, etc., which was accomplished years ago in older towns is just starting here now. Even though it will be years before these trees we put out this year are noticeable, the fact that they were planted will at least give our people credit for being progressive—as they have always proven themselves.

TEACHING BOYS TO SAVE

THERE IS, it seems, generally among boys, a growing habit to spend all the money given them, says the Portland Livestock Reporter. This habit does not make for a saving man when the boy gets old enough to earn money for himself.

To overcome the spending habit, a certain father has devised a rather novel plan to develop resisting power in his boys. Knowing the value of self-control, especially in money matters, he gives each boy a weekly allowance, with the stipulation that it must be carried in the pocket during the week, and only half of it spent.

One boy receives 20 cents each week. If he produces a dime at the week end he gets another 20 cents; if he doesn't he gets only a dime.

The other boy receives a dime, and must produce a nickel to get another dime.

There is thus a constant opportunity to spend, but a constant incentive to save—to resist.

It may be that the reward spurs them on, but the fact remains that this father is developing resisting power in the boys that will stand them in good stead in after years.

LETTERS FROM THE PEOPLE

A Plea for Volunteer Firemen

In forming an estimate of the value of a volunteer fire department, one is impressed by the fact that east of the Alleghenies cities of considerable size depend upon such systems at the present time. Only a short time ago Reading, Pa., a city of about 100,000 population, decided by an overwhelming vote not to change from volunteer to paid firemen. Moreover, it has been said by those who know, that speaking generally, Reading and other large places which still depend upon volunteer firemen get about as low insurance rates as like cities which have paid systems.

West of the Alleghenies towns of 5,000 and less population seem to look upon a volunteer department as a temporary expedient to be abolished as soon as the salaries of three or four regular men can be afforded. The underwriters apparently take the same view.

There is apt to come a time when the volunteers are neglected and get small encouragement (especially by the city council) for the particular town feels itself becoming a city, and is ashamed of its old protectors, though it may not have a total population equal to that of a single ward in such a place as Reading, but is regarded a so-called "paid system" as an evidence of metropolitan growth.

There is, of course, truth in this idea, but it does not justify slighting a good volunteer system for the sake of establishing a paid department so small and weak as to be unable to cope with the usual fire.

It would no doubt be highly desirable if volunteer firemen were different in nature and disposition from the rest of humanity, but they are not. It is unreasonable to expect them to be anything but ordinary mortals, for during something like 99 per cent of their time they live and occupy themselves like anyone else. Being just plain folks, they have an idea that if they volunteer to do work that others do not want to do, a certain amount of appreciation and support is due them.

When stood up in line and praised in extravagant terms by the orator of the day at some public celebration, the hearts of a few may swell with pride, but the majority would much rather have the council buy them 500 feet more hose or some good ladders. Being human, they may enthuse slightly over a grandiloquent write-up in the local paper, but they would remember longer and with much more

satisfaction a description of a fire in which they were given proper credit for what they know to be work worthy of commendation.

If the majority of the members of city councils in our volunteer towns would devote a little serious thought to these matters they would get along very much better with their firemen. In other words, the motto, "put yourself in his place" might serve a very useful purpose.

The average councilman does not enjoy jumping out of bed in the middle of the night to go to a fire, or if he does that much as a good citizen, he is apt to draw the line at running through a muddy street with a hose cart, and then getting soaked to the skin to save somebody's old barn. Why, then, does he not conclude that if there are certain young men in the town that are willing and even anxious to do these things, they can be sure of his good will and support.

The good will is needed the most. With it he will realize that the firemen may not always do their work according to his ideas, and may at times become over-zealous in their demands, but if he meets them in a friendly spirit it is a foregone conclusion that differences will be readily adjusted.

The man who last night had charge of controlling a fire that very nearly swept away the business part of the town may be expected to be emphatic and forceful in telling of fire protection needs. Somebody must take such matters seriously.

Just as a paid department must have the money due for salaries, the volunteers need to be given plenty of moral support. Of course this is a necessity in both systems, but it is often forgotten that the volunteers get practically nothing else as pay. Many a town would have had a serviceable and efficient volunteer department for years after the time of change had its members not been demoralized by the neglect and indifference of those who should have shown appreciation.

An important item in this regard is that the failure of the volunteer system often forces the installation of a paid system before the town can afford to make the latter what it should be. There is this much to say about the volunteers: They may not put the small fires out as quickly as do the paid men, but when the big, threatening blaze comes along they have the men to handle the number of hose lines that are necessary.

BLOODHOUNDS ON MURDERER'S TRAIL

THE MAN WHO KILLED BANKER JONES IS BEING PURSUED BY SHERIFF'S POSSE—FARMER IS SAID TO HAVE DRESSED ARM

SAN JOSE, Feb. 28.—Bloodhounds are trailing the murderer of Banker Jones. The trail was found in Alameda county, and the dogs immediately sent in pursuit. At noon they had reached Warm Springs, and headed toward Irvington.

A rancher near Berryessa said he treated a stranger's arm for a knife wound.

At the coroner's inquest today it was found that Jones came to his death through knife wounds inflicted by a party unknown.

There are available in many of paid departments, to which the citizens point with such pride. This is only mentioned because it must be taken into consideration when volunteers are to be done away with.

Partly because of the advantage gained in having a man at the head who gets along well with the council, citizens and firemen (as long as this is possible) the character and efficiency of any department depends very largely upon the chief. This is true in all systems, but more especially in the volunteers. It is very seldom necessary to say to volunteers that they should appreciate and respect the right kind of a man when they get him, but this is a piece of advice that might often be given to city councils. Turmoil among the firemen and inefficiency at fires only make worry and trouble for the city fathers, hence they should highly esteem the chief who can give them the peace and protection they think themselves entitled to.

The volunteer fireman is by no means out of date. He will be the guardian of lives and property of thousands and thousands of people long after we are forgotten. He is necessary in countless communities, because he gives a protection that cannot otherwise be secured, and a very real protection it is, too, under proper conditions.

Now a word for the Klamath Falls fire department. Having been a member for a number of years, I feel it my duty to say that Klamath Falls has a very efficient fire department, and that too much credit and support (especially the latter) cannot be given it, and I believe that if our city council would show a little more kindly interest toward the welfare of our department, that we could improve our efficiency and have even a better department.

I will make the statement, and I believe I am correct, that Klamath Falls has the most efficient fire department of any city of like size on the Pacific Coast, with less expense to the taxpayers.

Why, then, should our city council step in and take this matter out of efficient hands, and burden the taxpayers with a lot of unnecessary expense, and at the same time decrease the efficiency of the department? They have laid down a set of rules, or a so-called ordinance, that no ordinary mortal would work under, and are apparently trying to force their views of religion into the fire department.

On behalf of the fire department, I wish to thank the public for their loyal support of the fire department in the past, and I trust they will support us in the future.
