Trades for Klamath Land.
A deal has just been closed between City Attorney Rollo C. Groesbeck and W. A. Calkins, whereby Calkins becomes owner of an apple orchard in the Yakima Valley and Groesbeck acquires 160 acres of valley land about eight miles from Klamath Falls. The trade involves about \$6,000.

House Committee Votes Larger Standing Army

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 28.—The house military committee Saturday voted for a regular standing army of 137,000 men, with a 2 per cent allowance for recruiting, bringing the number up to 140,000, which is slightly more than the war department asked. The republicans and three democrats carried the vote.

Voting in the committee began at a proposal for 220,000 men. The number was gradually scaled down until a proposal for 150,000 men was beaten by one vote. Then the republicans and three democrats put through the provision as it was finally accepted by the committee to be incorporated in the bill to be presented to the house. The war department's estimate of additional officers for the regular army also was increased from 786 to 1,000.

The section of reorganizing the National Guard was framed to provide for a maximum strength of 424,000 men, of which 50 per cent must be recruited within two years. The senate committee has practically agreed on a provision for several summer student encampments at the direction of the president. Those who take the instruction would be mustered into a special federal reserve, pledging themselves to serve the country if needed, but being quite apart from the regular army reserve or the National Guard. The plan resembles the continental army scheme somewhat.
