IT LOOKS GOOD

THE SPIRIT of optimism is in the air, and from present indications the year 1916 is going to be the most successful in the history of Klamath Falls and Klamath county. This feeling of the return of good times seems to have taken hold not only of the farmers of the county, but the business men of this city.

On every hand one hears predictions of good times for this summer, and this attitude on the part of merchants of Klamath Falls is not confined to talk, for they are showing their faith in the belief of returning prosperity by the investment of real money in preparedness. Stores are being remodeled, improvements made and new fixtures and equipment added, and everything being done to enable the stores to handle a greater business than ever.

Different reasons are assigned for this firm belief in coming good times, and in some cases no reason at all is advanced, but whether or not there is sufficient foundation, this feeling permeates the entire citizenship of the county.

Klamath county has many reasons for expecting good times, and not least important is the change for the better in the lumber market. People who have carefully studied the question of growth and development for this section, admit that we must look for immediate expansion to the lumber industry. With the building up of box factories and lumber mills will come the more permanent industries that go to make a great city and community.

One of the most pleasing features of this feeling of optimism is the spirit it has engendered among the business men of the city. There is a strong feeling developing that the time has arrived when our people should give their time and energies to big things, and that all petty squabbling and dissensions of a personal nature should be buried forever, and each individual should give his whole attention to working for the building up of this community, which means success for the individual as well as the city and county. This is the spirit that will place Klamath county where it justly belongs, among the progressive sections of the West.

PRINCIPLES PRECEDE PRACTICE

NEW and important principles of scientific agriculture are discovered almost daily by research specialists of the Oregon Agricultural College experiment station.

Many of these principles are of great importance to the cause of science and indispensable to the best college instruction, but it is only when they are taken out of the realm of the academic and applied to the arts and business of life that they accomplish their highest purpose.

It is the duty of the extension service to carry this information, after it has been thoroughly tested out, from the college to the people. Much of the information goes out as news stories, and editors that publish those of value to their community are helping to better farm and home life.

WILSON AND CONGRESS

DISCUSSING Mr. Garrison's resignation, the New York Times, somewhat parenthetically remarks: "The country will give its instant, loyal and determined support to the president in any contest congress may invite through refusal, from whatever motive, to make provision for really adequate defense of the nation."

Nevertheless, we have just witnessed such an occurrence. Mr. Wilson went before congress when this session opened and argued in favor of the Garrison plan for an increase in the army. Congress invited a contest on this point. Well nigh unanimously the military committee rejected the proposal, and they were sustained by their colleagues on the floor. Yet Mr. Wilson did not accept the challenge of congress, nor did he appeal to the country for "its instant, loyal and determined support." On the contrary, he surrendered in such abject man-

ner that Secretary Garrison quit the cabinet almost instantly.

The president will not quarrel with congress this year. Neither can he boss it in such masterful fashion as he did two years ago. His own party no longer acknowledges the president's will as law. The dissensions in the democratic party have been emphasized by Mr. Garrison's resignation—and the president's weakness as a party leader and as a formulator of national policies is emphasized by the same incident. If the country is to witness any "provisions for really adequate defense of the nation," such as the New York Times evidently wishes to see, it will be the patriotic action of the republicans in congress.

Two Tentative Bills
Drafted for Opening
All or Part of Land

ted to any Indian, but jointly owned by the tribe.

Following this, the Secretary of the interior is to cause allotments to be made to all Indians of the Klamath and Modoc tribes and of the Yahooskin band of Plutes, who are entitled to allotments, and have not as yet received them, these to be made within six months after the passage of the bill.

After the allotments are made, the bill provides for the setting aside of the interior to the benefit of the Indians, this timber to be sold under regulations to be arranged later, and the money to be paid pro rata to all of the Indians entitled to it. The land is still tribal property, to be used for grazing, etc.

The bill provides further that within six months after the approval of the commissioners' reports and the allotment of lands to all Indians, all other lands except those classified as timber lands, shall be opened to settlement by proclamation of the president. This proclamation shall set forth the date when, and the manner in which these lands shall be sold.

The proceeds of these land sales will be divided pro rata among the Indians entitled to a share by reason of being a tribal member.

The commission is empowered to employ such help as it may need in investigations. The proposed bill also provides for an appropriation to pay these expenses.

Most of the provisions of the second bill are much like those of the first. This provides for the offering for sale of all tribal lands, within thirty days after the commission files its report on classification and appraisal of tribal land.

The land, according to this, is to be advertised for sale by the superintendent of the reservation, and moneys received will be kept by the Indian service until there is \$1,000 for each Indian authorized to share in a distribution, when it is to be divided pro rata among them. This plan, according to the terms of the second bill, is to continue until each Indian has received \$5,000, after which the money shall be placed in the United States treasury and the interest derived therefrom will be divided annually among the Indians.

The bill also provides for the reducing of the areas of the Klamath agency and the Yainax sub-agency to 640 acres. These agencies are to remain as long as the Indians need agency and Indian bureau educational facilities.

The opening of the reservation would mean the addition of a vast territory to Klamath county's taxable area. It would thus mean a material reduction in the taxes now paid by the individual, and would give the Klamath Indians, recognized as among the brightest of their race, what they have long sought—citizenship and a chance to do for themselves.
