

Admiral Knight Says America's Policies Are Likely to Make War

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 29.—Explaining that the demands upon the American navy are equal to those of England's, Admiral Knight, head of the Naval War College today told the house naval committee that the Monroe doctrine, the Chinese open door policy, the Panama canal and Asiatic exclusion might drag America into war at any time.

"America stands for more policies irritable to other world powers than does any other nation," said he. "They will eventually draw us into conflict."

"The division of the Atlantic fleet so a part of it can go to the Pacific would be the most fatal thing we could do now."

"I believe the present war will leave England with fewer ships," said Knight in conclusion. "If she wins, she will have no other enemy. If we draw closer to her in naval strength, she, too, may start a building program."

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Knight does not favor the building of dreadnoughts this year. He urges construction immediately of six battle cruisers and eight swift scout cruisers.

Naval bases should be established in the Caribbean Sea and the Pacific, Knight said, and he also recommended floating drydocks in both oceans.
