IT STRIKES HOME

CHARLES F. STONE'S article in yesterday's Herald, calling for action in the matter of a better road to Crater Lake, has already brought about results. One man has subscribed \$25 in cash, Fort Klamath men say their section will almost meet the county half way in labor and teams, and Klamath Falls men are of the opinion that all who turn out on "Good Roads Day" this year should work for the improvement of the road between Klamath Falls and Crater Lake.

Crater Lake is an attraction bringing people from all parts of the world. It is geographically Klamath's property, but the tourist has no sentimental interest in such a thing; he wishes to get there by the best road. If Klamath wishes to retain her reputation as the favorite gateway to Crater Lake, real constructive work is imperative just as soon as the weather permits.

PROTECT THE BIRDS

SOON the unending stream of bird life will set in northward. Already the warblers that have been spending their winter in northern South America are doubtless on their way to their northern haunts, some of them in far-off Alaska. Bobolinks that last fall made their long trip away down into southern Brazil must be on their way back to entertain us with their exuberant wing song during the warm days of summer. Certainly these songsters who come so far from the Southland to make their nests among us deserve our affectionate care and protection.

Nature study is one of the most stimulating of employments, and bird study is the most inspiring branch of nature study. Love of nature, love of birds and love of fellowmen are a trinity of affections that are early developed in the mind and heart of the child reared in the country if his training includes a study of nature in her larger aspect and a development of his observative faculties to a point where he has "eyes to see and ears to hear."

But the birds have a practical value as aids to the cause of agriculture, for they destroy millions of insect enemies and consume tons of noxious weed seeds. If the birds should fall in a single year to find their way northward, agriculture in the great north temperate zone would suffer incalculable damage; indeed it has been declared that without the aid of the birds man would face starvation, because he would be helpless against the onslaughts of his insect enemies. Be that as it may, the birds deserve the friendship and protection of man, and wherever their beauty and worth are appreciated steps are being taken to provide them with nesting places and with food in times of scarcity. In fact, many birds that now migrate will remain in a given locality all the year in they are supplied with food during the winter period. The pleasure that young people especially derive from kindness of this sort is in itself evidence of growth in character and advancement along paths of civilization and refinement.

WOOL BRINGS FROM 20 TO 26 CENTS AT PENDLETON

PENDLETON, March 1.—Three quarters of a million pounds of wool, said to be the largest clip owned by a single sheep man in the country, was contracted for at a sale Saturday by R. N. Stanfield to H. C. Judd & Root company of Hartford, Conn.

The sale was negotiated by E. J. Burke, local representative, and the lot comprised both fine and coarse wool. The price paid for fine was said to have been within a fraction of 20 cents a pound, and on coarse within a fraction of 26 cents. The transaction probably involves \$150,000. The wool is now on the sheeps' backs, and will be delivered in the spring.
