CONSERVATION AN ECONOMIC WASTE

Gifford Pinchot and other politicians are now bending every effort to force legislation through the United States senate forevermore tying up the water powers of the Western water power states. There is no ground for their argument that it is necessary to do this to prevent the people being robbed by power companies, for the simple reason that the power companies no longer have the rate making solely in their hands alone, their rates are under the jurisdiction of state and interstate commerce commissions. Why have the government take over all the water powers of the Western states and not take over the undeveloped coal fields of the East? Why remove from development one of the West's greatest industrial assets, water power, and leave coal free to private development in the East. Theoretical politicians like to "conserve" other people's resources, but they don't try it on themselves at home. It would be interesting to know how much taxes Gifford Pinchot and his political friends pay in the states of Washington, Oregon and California, where they are doing their best to tie up industrial development.

Now is the time to turn the spotlight of publicity on these theorists, and show what they are really trying to do to our resources, and how they are driving capital away from our borders. Under Pinchot's policies 57 per cent of the area of the state of Oregon is untaxed, leaving 43 per cent to pay the running expenses of the whole. Now this policy is to be further extended by the so-called conservation of their water powers. This does not tend to bring capital here to develop cheap power.

George L. Walker in the Boston Commercial of February 19th, says: "If this country is to go ahead industrially, an immense amount of mechanical power must be developed. Is it better that the coal deposits or the waterfalls should be conserved? One or the other must furnish the power for the country."

Mr. Pinchot thought the coal measures of Alaska should be conserved; also the forests; and now the water powers. The rest of us in the United States do not agree with him fully, and therefore it would seem to be up to him to remove his place of residence to the interior of South America or Africa, where everything is being conserved.

If there is anyone left who has the courage to invest his capital in the development and equipment of a water power in the United States, he given the privilege of doing so, and he should also be awarded a medal for bravery.

That water powers or anything else should be operated at cost for the alleged "benefit of the people" is a figment of the imagination. Profits are just as essential to industrial and material progress as food is to a growing child.

If the full product of industry were divided equally among those who take part in its production there would be no fund with which to build for the future. Until there is a sufficient accumulation to pay for clearing the land, providing the seed and cultivating the plants, there can be no harvest, and a part of each crop must be saved for seed and to feed the workers until harvest time the following year.

The population of the United States is increasing, and the only way to provide for the growing numbers of people with food, raiment and shelter is by the development of the country's natural resources, the extension of its industries and the continuing increase of its production.

A relatively small portion of the profits of industry is wasted by the rich on luxuries and extravagance; but more than three-quarters of all net earnings are reinvested, and the profits thereon reinvested in such a way that the public gets the full benefit to the last dollar.

Fortunately approximately all of the profits so far made in this country have been invested at home. After they begin to be invested abroad the people of other countries will get the benefit of them. If Gifford Pinchot's dreams are permitted to come

true, American capital will go abroad in shiploads.

The old song says: "The mill will never grind with the waters that are passed." The only way to conserve water power is by developing and using it. By this method the millions of horse power now running to waste every day should be conserved. Mr. Pinchot to the contrary notwithstanding.

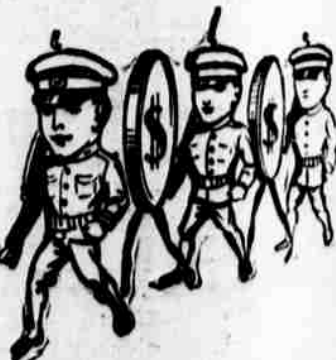
