

Index at Rome Places a Ban on Works of Poet

ROME, Feb. 29.—(By mail).—According to well informed Vatican circles the congregation of the Index has just prepared a ban of interdiction against all the recent works of Gabriele D'Annunzio, one of Italy's greatest modern poets, novelists, dramatists, and, it might even be said, probably her greatest modern patriot. The publication of the decree is expected to arouse one of the stormiest affairs of modern Italian life since the separation of the Vatican and the Quirinal.

Although D'Annunzio's literary fame has long been established it is only since Italy began her military career four years ago with the campaign of Tripoli, that D'Annunzio has won for himself a place in the hearts of all Italians along with Garibaldi, Victor Emmanuel and King Victor's two immediate predecessors.

D'Annunzio's history during the Tripoli war, singing the glory of Italian arms, aroused all Italy to a veritable frenzy of appreciation and admiration. Even this was outdone when early in the present war D'Annunzio made himself a champion of Italy's entrance and both by pen and voice worked day and night with all the genius at his command until Italy finally got in. His reward was the decoration from King Victor Emmanuel of the order of the Annunziata, which makes him a cousin of the king, and the enshrining of himself in the hearts of the Italian people as its most popular idol.

Under the circumstances the congregation of the Index is declared seriously to have considered the advisability of a ban at the present moment against D'Annunzio's latest works, nearly all of which consist of poems inspired by Italy's military glory. It was recognized that such an action at this time undoubtedly would call down on the Vatican the anger of all Italy. More than a few Italians would be inclined to regard the ban as another Vatican blow at the Quirinal.

SYRIAN GIRL STARTS CLERKS' FUND TO BUILD A SUBMARINE

NEWARK, O., March 7.—Miss Anzousa Sahadi, aged nineteen, a Syrian girl here has sworn her allegiance to the cause of the defense of the United States, and she has started a popular subscription fund among the Retail Clerks' association of the United States, asking each member to contribute 25 cents, the total to be given to the adjutant general of Ohio to use for building a submarine for the government of the United States.

The project has the approval of state officials and Miss Sahadi was given a check for a substantial contribution by the governor. The banks have volunteered to be depositaries for the fund. Already more than \$300 has been subscribed here. Circular letters have been sent to the secretary of every retail clerks' association in the country asking for their support and favorable replies have been received from many of them.

Miss Sahadi was born in the foothills of Mt. Olive near the cities of Beirut and Damascus, both famous in biblical history, and she seeks to show the people of the United States how deeply at heart the Syrian people have for the welfare of our country.

COMMANDER UNDER GENERAL GRANT DIES IN MEDFORD

MEDFORD, March 6.—General William Schoonmaker, commander of Union cavalry during Grant's Shiloh and Vicksburg campaigns, died Saturday in his 86th year.

Born in Ohio in 1830, he graduated from West Point in 1853. Leaving the army at the close of the war, he attained fame as a civil engineer in the Middle West, constructing the first bridge across the Missouri River at Omaha and solving the foundation problem for skyscrapers.

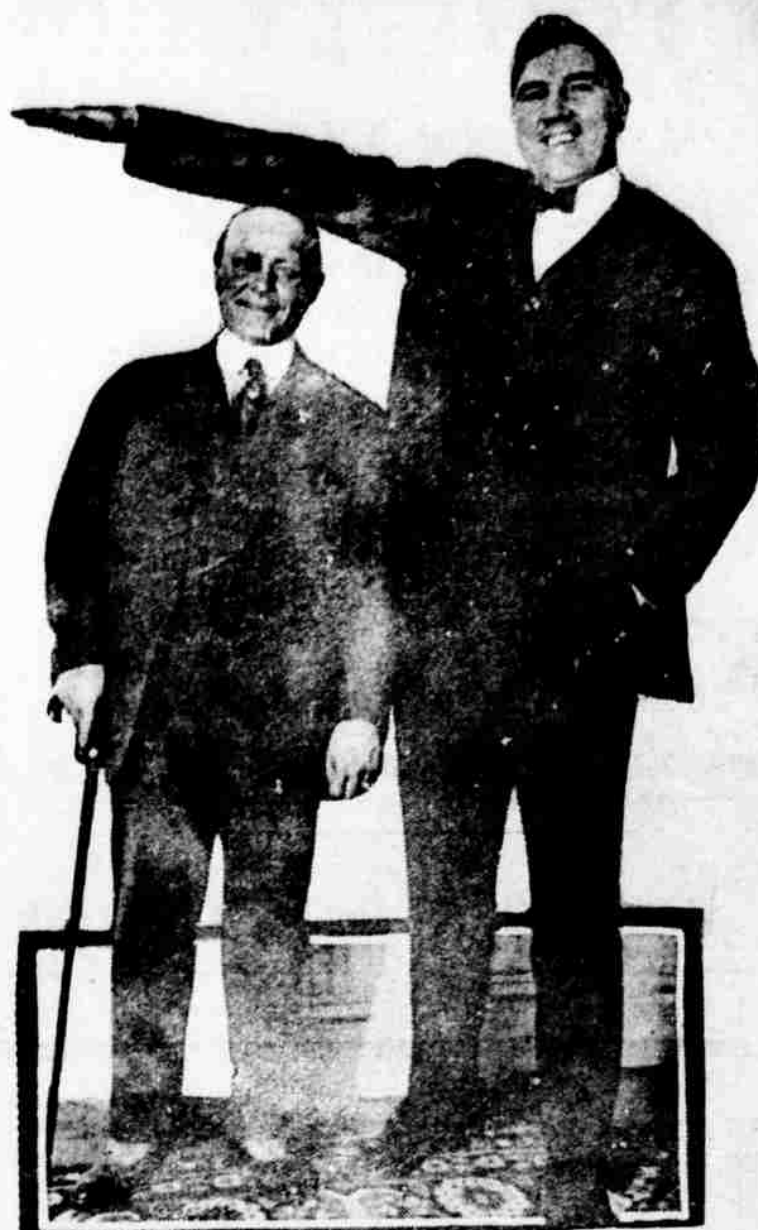
The order marks the first step to work the aeronautical service, co-ordinately with the battle fleet, as is being done by the European navies in the war.

QUINCY, Mass., March 6.—The United States torpedo boat destroyer Sampson, named for the late Admiral W. T. Sampson, U.S.N., was launched from the yards of the Fore River Shipbuilding corporation Saturday.

The Sampson is one of the largest destroyers of the navy, with an overall length of 315 feet. She went into the water 78 per cent completed.
