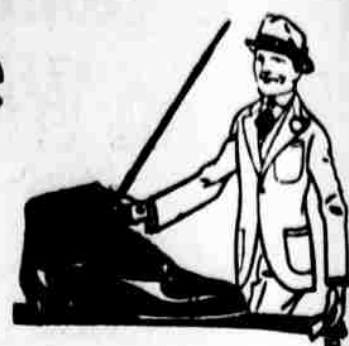

New Bowling Alleys.

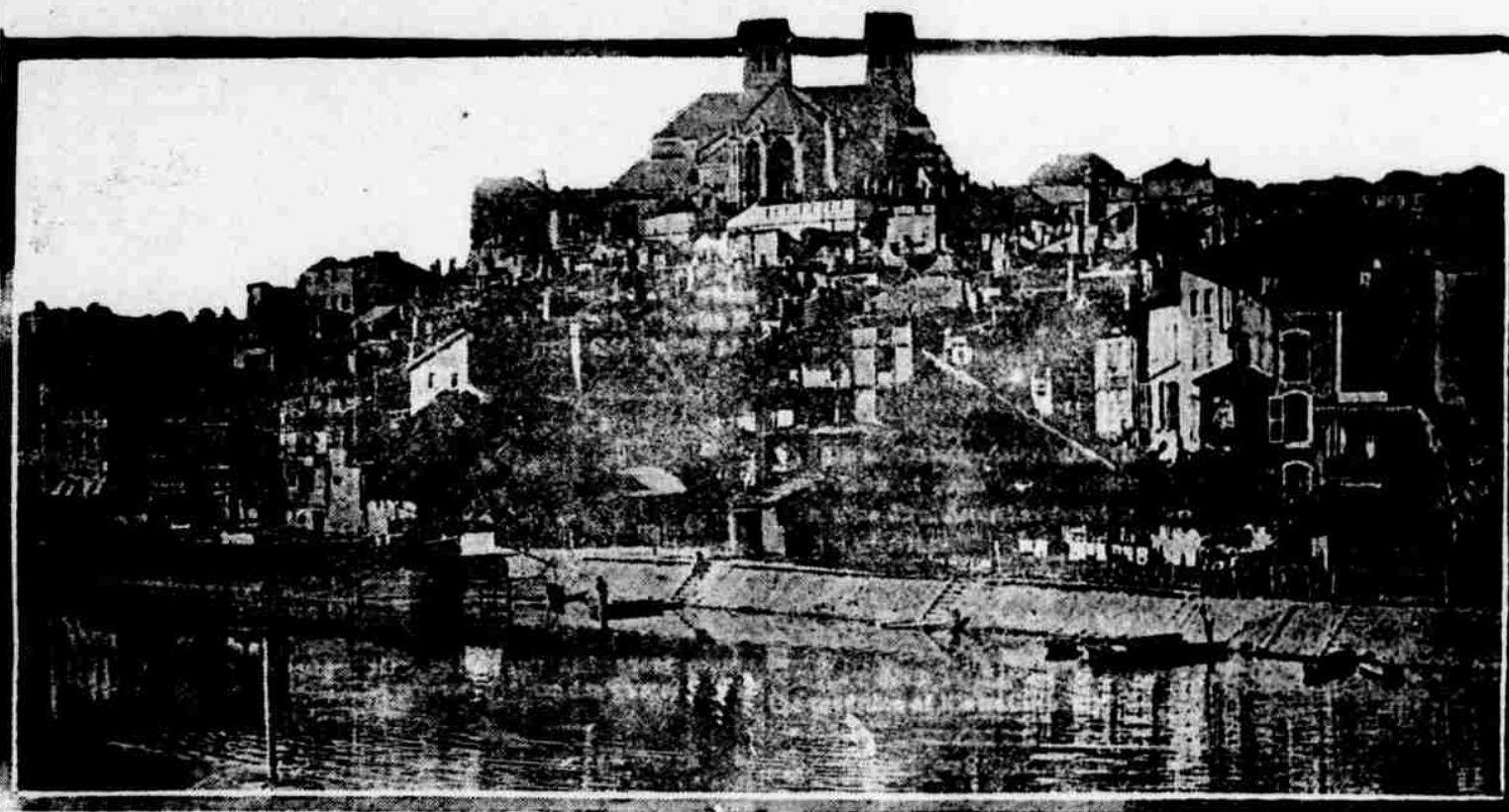

DAIRYMEN OFFER FIRST AID CURE

STATE DAIRYMEN'S CONVENTION GOES ON RECORD AS CONTENTING HOT MILK BEATS BOOZE FOR CHILL CURE

Let Oregon legislate out liquor; chills will not prove fatal if a remedy the Oregon State Dairy convention recommends is used. Hot milk, say the dairymen, beats whiskey as a cure for chills—but to date no substitute antidote for snake bites is forthcoming.

Here's the resolution passed: Whereas, It has been well proven that hot milk is a better stimulant in case of chill or exhaustion than whiskey, and that either hot or cold milk, alone or in combination with various flavors or spices, can be made into drinks that are both extremely palatable and nutritious; and,

Whereas, The passing of the saloon in the three northwestern states creates a great opportunity for the larger use of milk, by having it kept in the soft drink houses; therefore, be it Resolved, That the president is authorized and instructed to appoint a committee to act either directly or in conjunction with the lately organized dairy council, whose duty it shall be to prepare literature and have it distributed, setting forth the value of hot milk as a stimulant, and of other milk drinks as a beverage, and giving recipes and suggestions for their use; and each member of this association is urged to personally try to induce soft drink houses, coffee houses, etc., to keep hot milk and other milk drinks constantly on hand.

700,000 MEN AS A PEACE ARMY

HOUSE MILITARY COMMITTEE REACHES AN AGREEMENT ON THE BILL TO BE PRESENTED THIS WEEK

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 6.—A final agreement was reached by the house military committee on its bill for the increase of the army, and it will be reported unanimously to the house early this week.

In round figures the measure would authorize the formation of an army composed of regulars, national guardsmen and federal volunteers with a total peace strength of approximately 700,000 men.

It provides for a maximum strength of 170,000 fighting troops for the regular army, for a minimum of 425,000 for the national guard within five years and for organization of federal volunteers through an extension of a summer training camp idea. It is estimated that 100,000 men can be enrolled in the latter force.

The house committee on rules has agreed upon ninety minutes' debate tomorrow on the rule concerning the McLeary warning resolution, and four hours of debate upon the merits of the resolution.

Congressman Mann, republican leader, declared in the house today that Americans ought to be kept off armed ships. He was applauded heartily by the representatives.

Mr. and Mrs. Hunter, who had leased the ranch from Lawrence, and the latter lived with these people.

Accounts as to the beginning of the battle differ, but the first shot were fired after Hunter and young Kuehne had engaged in an altercation, Kuehne shooting Hunter in the arm. Lawrence and Mrs. Kuehne then came out and many shots were fired, ending with the killing of Mrs. Kuehne.

Mrs. Hunter and Lawrence stated that Mrs. Hunter fired the fatal shot from inside the house, shooting Mrs. Kuehne just as the latter raised a revolver to shoot Hunter. Mrs. Kuehne's dying statement was that Lawrence shot her, and the coroner's jury also accused Lawrence of the murder.

Jamaica Lecture Was Interesting

The Sunday evening lecture on "Jamaica" at the Christian church last night was well attended and the talk by Rev. J. W. Jenkins was highly instructive. Mr. Jenkins spent three and a half years as a missionary in Jamaica, and his description, amplified with stereopticon views, was clear and vivid.
