BOOMERANG CAMPAIGNING

DISTRICT ATTORNEY JOHN IRWIN'S tactics in the circuit court yesterday, when he refused to proceed with the trial of a murder case that had been set for that date for some time, if a political move, as some contend, can hardly be called a boost to his already meagre chance for re-nomination. The prosecuting attorney's duty is the upholding of the laws, not the refusal to prosecute serious cases ready for trial.

The Hunters, who were dismissed from custody, have also been placed in an embarrassing position, as they were all in readiness to seek to show their innocence, and now, without a trial, they are liable to indictment and additional worry and expense, just because Irwin saw fit to try Lawrence before the Hunters.

HITCHING RACKS

ESTABLISHING hitching racks near the court house on Klamath avenue by the council is a step in the right direction for the encouragement of home trade, but why not go a step further? Why not lease or rent some property along Klamath or Walnut streets and fit this up as a municipal hitching place?

Such a move would greatly lessen the danger of accidents to traffic on Klamath avenue, where the teams are tied to racks, with the wagons extending nearly halfway across the street. There have been several narrow escapes from fatalities, owing to this. The establishment of a hitching lot, instead of hitching posts on the streets would also be better for the farmers' horses, which are unused to standing on pavement.

But don't forget for a moment that the establishment of the racks is a progressive step by the city. We are all prone to deplore the fact that money is sent away for goods that could be purchased at local stores, but we have been dilatory in taking steps to encourage the patronizing of Klamath establishments by providing for the convenience of the out-of-town patrons.

WHAT NEXT?

APARENTLY Wilson is putting the reverse English on the old saddle. "In time of peace, prepare for war," when he names a dyed-in-the-wool pacifist and foe to preparedness as secretary of war. Of all the queer stunts—and these have been legion—that the president has pulled off, this move of appointing Baker as Garrison's successor is the queerest, and it is one that the democrat followers of Wilson will not be able to lucidly explain.

With our national defenses in charge of Baker, a known opponent of adequate armament, and Daniels, whose puerile regulations have made the navy a national laughing stock, it looks up to the nation to follow Wilson's suggestion, and be "too proud to fight." But then—pride sometimes goeth before a fall.

Scattered Shots

THE PREPAREDNESS question is now settled. The Klamath debaters won last night.

IN VIEW OF the fact that he refused to issue search warrants when the police requested them, Irwin's chances of getting his sleuths named as policemen are about as good as Wilson's for re-election. Even should Mayor Mason make the appointments, there would be trouble in getting confirmation from the councilmen.

WILSON HAS not only driven two men out of his cabinet, but he has driven at least two of his wheel-horses in congress to quit politics. He certainly works hard to retain his following—which he will so sadly need this year.

THE MEETING tomorrow night for the consideration of the road to Shippington and Pelican City should be attended by everybody interested. A payroll close to \$50,000 a month which would be spent mainly here, is isolated on account of the miserable highway conditions, although Shippington is within the city limits.

can," said Mayor Mason. "I don't know whether I have the right to make such appointments, as police are under the direction of the chief."

"The sole purpose in asking this is the cleaning up of illegal liquor traffic in the city," Irwin replied. "Violations are going on. I haven't seen any of the police force at my office."

"Isn't it a fact that they did come to your office, and that you wouldn't issue warrants?" Doty inquired.

"I refused then because I felt there was insufficient evidence," said Irwin. "Since then, no police have been to my office."

"We want to co-operate with you in this work," said Miller. "We want to work for the stamping out of liquor, and if this is good, we want to herald the fact all over the United States. If the mayor can fulfill your request, he will."

"There is bootlegging going on here," Irwin reiterated. "The men I suggest will get them if they get the power. I am here in the interest of the criminal laws. If the police bring in things, I will be glad to take up

the matter—providing there is sufficient evidence."

There was further parley regarding the issuance of search warrants by Irwin at the request of the police before the matter was disposed of for the evening.
