## INDIANS PLAN A GOOD ROADS JOB

THREE DAYS' FREE WORK TO BE DONE BY EACH KLAMATH, UNDER DIRECTION OF INDIAN ROAD SUPERVISOR

The Klamath Indians can be counted upon to do their share toward road improvement this year. Plans are now being made for a big program of volunteer road work.

The reservation is to be divided into three districts, each district to be in charge of an Indian foreman. The work for each district will be laid out, and the Indians in each district will each do three days of work without pay.

The employees of Engineer Hinck's reclamation project will also do some volunteer work. Last year this crew built several wooden bridges without pay. With the Fort Klamath men ready to help in that section, and Klamath Falls men preparing to work toward Crater Lake on "Good Roads Day," much toward improving the route to Crater Lake should be accomplished without any cost to the county.

## FIRST STEP FOR 11TH ST. TAKEN

RESOLUTION DECLARING INTENT TO HARD SURFACE STREET, AND CALLING FOR SURVEYS, ETC., PASSED BY COUNCIL

The initial step by the council for the pavement of Eleventh street was taken by the council last night by the adoption of a resolution declaring the city's intention to improve the street, and directing the city engineer to prepare preliminary data as to the costs, etc.

The project contemplates the paving of Eleventh street with bitulithic, or other hard surface pavement, twenty-four feet in width and concrete curbing. The project extends on Eleventh street to the south bank of the U. S. reclamation service canal, and from the north bank of the canal along Eleventh to Upham, and along Upham to Prospect street.

## SUFFRAGE CARNIVAL BALL IN NEW YORK TONIGHT

NEW YORK, March 7.—Ten thousand dancers will glide and whirl to the tune of votes for women at the suffrage carnival ball in Madison Square Garden tonight. Society with a brilliant capital S will adorn the boxes and fill the floor. There will be a perfect storm of gowns and gables with a smattering of mere males in sombre fish and soup suits. Two hundred coy maidens will skitter about taking masculine attention with giggles and gaudy gabardines and masculine money with useless programs. A band will blare and lights will glare, and millions of dollars worth of jagged jewels will twinkle, twinkle gaily.

Women who like the life will discuss their suffrage and men who don't will discuss their sufferings. Hundreds of perfectly good digestions will be ruined with punch and lunch, and in the words of the cop at the door, "it will be 'some jamboree for the suff.' All for the paltry pittance of sixty copper cents per admittance. Mrs. John Blair headed the arrangements committee, and much of the elaborate preparatory work was done by Francis W. Crowninshield, editor of a well known fashion magazine.

## TWICE AS MUCH CANADIAN IS STORED THIS YEAR

WINNIPEG, Man., March 7.—Two and a half times as much grain is stored in Western Canada elevators today as was tied up one year ago. Railroad congestion is blamed. Sudden releasing of the vast crop stored would revolutionize cash prices, it is admitted.

Estimates today showed 53,685,588 bushels of grain stored in Western Canada now, as compared with 25,213,801 bushels a year ago. Of this grain now on hand, 42,808,553 bushels is wheat, as compared with 18,363,476 bushels of wheat stored a year ago.

Theodore Roosevelt's administration's move in the states for Canadian reciprocity was considered today to have been finally defeated in the Manitoba legislature. The agitation was for the adoption of grain duties for exports into the states. J. G. Turiff's contention being that such a move would raise grain prices for the farmer. Sir Thomas Lipton opposed the move on the ground that higher prices agitation is illusory and temporary, and that the change was undesirable from a standpoint of the broad lines of national policy. Turiff's resolution was definitely tabled.

## Kaiser Plans a Powerful Confederation of States

PARIS, March 7.—The Kaiser plans to establish a powerful confederation of central and near Eastern European states. He seeks to bring 87,000,000 Austrians, Hungarians, Serbians, Rumanians, Bulgarians, Montenegrins, Turks and Greeks under German domination.

This is the opinion of Professor Masaryk, former Bohemian leader in the Austrian reichsrath, who escaped from Austria at the beginning of the war, and has spent his time since in France and England, the soul of the movement to restore Bohemia's independence. He discussed the situation recently with Premier Briand, and was encouraged by the premier to persevere in his effort to free his country from Hapsburg rule.

The surest way to prevent realization of the pan-German dream is to up set the Hapsburg dynasty, Professor Masaryk says. Otherwise, he asserted, even after Germany has been beaten, she will still be capable of further harm. Her vulnerable point, as he views it, is Austria-Hungary.

The Hapsburg family, he urged upon Premier Briand, is Germany's slave, and while it continues to reign Austria will remain under German control. Not only is there no prospect that Austria-Hungary will turn against Germany, as some imagine, but pan-Germanism is gaining ground at Budapest, as well as Vienna, the professor insists.

But if Austria-Hungary should be eliminated as a national entity, it has been suggested to the Bohemian leader, would not Germany necessarily add the Austrian-Germans to her own citizens, thereby gaining strength by about 7,000,000 population?

Yes, of course, agreed the professor, but that would be better than at present, for now, with the Hapsburgs' help, Berlin's rule extends directly over 51,000,000 Austro-Hungarian subjects.

Austria's destruction would not mean destruction of the nations of which Austria is composed, adds the professor, nor would the Hapsburg dynasty's overthrow necessarily mean that these nations could not constitute a federation, but if such a federation is to exist, it ought not to be under Germany's wing, but under the wing of the allies.
