Canny Connie Conceals His Prospects, Season

PHILADELPHIA, March 7.—What kind of a ball team Connie Mack will develop this season is a question no human but Connie can answer, as the Athletics start their spring training. And Mack is doing little talking these days, except to refer to his promise of last year that he would make the Athletics another powerful pennant winning team. The team started south today.

All last season, when the Athletics were trampled upon, kicked and mauled by every team in the American League, and during the winter, Connie Mack spread a dragnet over all the minor leagues and colleges for material, and formulated plans for his new machine.

Nobody knows how many unknowns Connie has under cover, but if his past constructive performances may be taken as harbingers, it is safe to predict the Athletics will furnish a few notches higher than the cellar.

With the "masked marvels" listed as an unknown quantity, it would appear that the Athletics are prepared in all departments except pitching and third base.

If training camp coaching has the proper effect the Athletics moundmen will be greatly improved over those of 1915. Wyckoff, Joe Bush and Bressler are figured as anchor men. Last season Wyckoff improved amazingly,

and around him, it is believed, Mack will build his staff. In addition, the Mackmen's pilot has Nabors and Myers, who toward the end of last season demonstrated that they were rapidly getting their stride.

The receiving end of the game is expected to be handled largely by Wally Schang and McAvoy. Young Perkins can also be counted upon to do a little catching. This boy, according to his team mates, is a comer. Those who saw him work in the North Carolina League feel certain this season will develop him greatly.

Mack is said practically to have decided that Jimmie Walsh will be the regular left fielder, with Oldring in center and Strunk in right. Davies, however, fits well in left field, and it would not cause great surprise if he were gallivanting around that section. Oldring, as a result of his "retirement," is in great shape. Rube spent his vacation on his farm, and appears to be quite capable of playing in his 1915 and 1914 style.

The infield problem probably will cause Mack a few headaches. Third base still is a great uncertainty, and shortstop will require a whole lot of consideration. Although several recruits are being tried out for the latter position, it is possible that Crane will be selected.

Healy and Ritter are being mentioned for third. In Ritter, Mack considers he has a future star, and looks for remarkable work from the youngster. McInnis is expected to be seen at first as usual, and Maline will probably see service at second in the place of Larry Lajole. Rumors are circulating that Larry will be seen with another team.

MANY BURNED IN BIG JAIL FIRE

SIXTEEN ARE KNOWN TO BE DEAD AND NINETEEN ARE IN HOSPITAL SUFFERING FROM SERIOUS INJURIES

EL PASO, March 7.—Police Captain Hall today stated that sixteen are known to be dead as a result of fire at the city jail last night, when disinfectants caught fire. Nineteen others are in the hospitals seriously injured.

Thirty-four nude men, mostly Mexicans, were in their cells, awaiting baths and were caught in sheets of flame when a morphine fender struck a match, setting fire to the fumes. The men were trapped in iron cells which became red hot before the prisoners were rescued.
