A SPELL OF SPELLING

CONSIDERING the poor spelling to be found in letters and other communications these days, and the constant query from persons supposedly well informed as to how to spell this or that, the present revival of the spelling bee through Klamath county is highly welcome. If the study of orthography should decline for another decade as it has during the last ten years, there would be several thousand methods of simplified spelling—each person spelling as he saw fit.

This wonderful lack of knowledge of spelling has become noticeable in many professions and callings. Several teachers have failed when given written tests, and many writers, ministers, lawyers, printers and others who are constantly called upon to write, must have a dictionary near them at all times to guide them.

JUGGLING POSTAL FIGURES

CONGRESSMAN FREDERICK H. GILLET of Massachusetts, January 20, 1916—There is one singular incident in connection with the annual estimates which attracted my attention. The secretary of the treasury in his annual report states that "the postal revenues will probably amount to \$316,000,000, with expenditures for the postal service for the same period under existing laws of \$324,000,000."

But the estimates for the postoffice appropriation bill were only \$316,000,000, and I wondered where that balance of \$8,000,000 was taken care of, and I finally found it tucked away in the estimates for permanent appropriations.

There is no precedent for placing it there. Why was not the postoffice bill estimated at \$324,000,000, instead of \$316,000,000? Why was that \$8,000,000 hidden under permanent appropriations? I can think of no reason—or, at least none that I care to suggest—and I think it ought to be explained.

INDEBTEDNESS INCURRED BY DESTRUCTION OF RODENTS BY THE STATE DURING BUBONIC PLAGUE SCARE

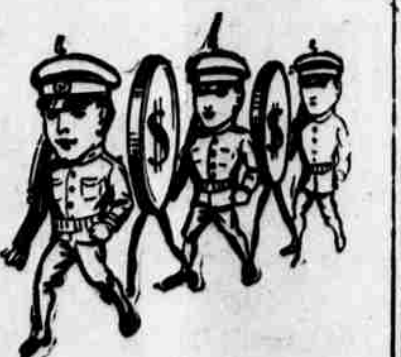

SACRAMENTO, March 10.—A fight to collect sums ranging from \$10 to \$500 from landowners upon whose property the state went to the expense of destroying ground squirrels is to be started immediately.

Under a law of 1913, aimed at bubonic plague spread by squirrels, the state was empowered to kill the pests and send the bill to persons owning the property from which the rodents were exterminated.

Many have refused to pay. The bills will be presented to county supervisors, and county officials will proceed to make the claims a lien upon the affected properties.
