THE FERRIS BILL

THE stand taken by the Seattle Chamber of Commerce in favor of development of water power is worthy of imitation by all commercial bodies in the West, says the Portland Oregonian. The resolutions expose the hollowness of the pretense that federal control is necessary to prevent harmful monopoly, and declares the provisions of the Ferris bill prohibitive of development. It asserts the rights of the Western states to the same control over their waters as enjoyed by all other states.

In their efforts to justify the Ferris bill, advocates of federal control and of the restrictions imposed by that bill persistently trot out the monopoly bogey. In so doing they ignore entirely the efficient regulative bodies of the states and the right reserved by the states to acquire water power plants and sites by exercising the right of eminent domain. Existence of harmful monopoly is thus made impossible.

They ignore also the fundamental principle of equality among the states. That principle requires that the Western states have as full control over their waters as have the Eastern and Southern states. It forbids congress to use government ownership of power sites as a lever wherewith to oust the Western states from control of their water.

In this controversy it is imperative that the people of the West stand together for the full development of their water resources under state authority. The interest of California, Oregon and Washington is identical in this matter. Their people should pull together and should refuse to be deluded by those who falsely charge the defenders of their rights with being the tools of a power trust, which is wholly mythical.

ABSENCE OF AMERICANS CLOSE BOND STREET SHOPS

United Press Service LONDON, March 13.—Bond street, London's aristocratic show shop thoroughfare, is suffering heavily on account of the war, it was learned for the first time today. Some Bond street shop owners already have appeared in court requesting a reduction of their valuation, and have summoned witnesses to prove their cases. Evidence elicits that there are now thirty-three vacant shops in New Bond street and ten in Old Bond street, whereas there was not a single vacancy at the beginning of the war. Many shopkeepers have moved their stocks to less expensive neighborhoods.

There is practically no sale for luxurious lace, expensive jewelry, Chinese porcelains, Italian embroideries, paintings by old masters and hundreds of other articles usually bought by the rich.

The situation, according to the Bond street salesmen, is chiefly due to the absence of American and continental buyers. The British trade is practically nil.

Girl Wife Charged with Murder, and Chum Who Disappeared



City Attorney Marshall Spooner of Fort Worth, Texas, declares that Mrs. Charles Harrison, 15-year-old bride, who confessed killing W. L. Warren, aged 50, a hotel owner, will be prosecuted, despite intimations that no trial would be held.

Mrs. Harrison says she killed Warren because he lured her to his hotel. She married Harrison, aged 20, two days later. Harrison is a son of James Harrison, prominent banker, and a nephew of Senator Charles A. Culbertson.

Miss Lois Gulon told the authorities that Mrs. Harrison was the slayer after G. B. Wiggins had been arrested. She said she did not want to see an innocent man suffer. Miss Gulon and Mrs. Harrison were chums and confidantes. Miss Gulon has recently disappeared.

Gasoline Can Now Be Extracted From Shale, Say U. S. Geologists

In view of the ever-increasing demand for gasoline and the increase in price of crude oil, from which it is obtained, it is important to know that an almost inexhaustible supply of oil may be obtained from the shale of northwestern Colorado, northeastern Utah and southwestern Wyoming. This shale contains materials which, when heated, may be converted into crude oil, gas and ammonia. The high cost of distilling oil from shale as compared to the cost of producing oil from wells has thus far prevented the development in this country of such an industry and may continue to prevent it for some time, but sooner or later this great source of supply will be utilized to supplement the decreasing production from the regular oil fields.

The oil derived from the shale is similar to that which is being produced from wells in the United States at the rate of more than 25,000,000 barrels a year. When refined by ordinary methods the shale oil yields an average of about 10 per cent gasoline, 35 per cent kerosene, and a large per-

cent of paraffin. The yield of gasoline from the shale may probably be largely increased by the use of refining methods especially designed for that purpose. The gas, which is a very good illuminating gas, will perhaps be sufficient to furnish all the heat required to distill the crude oil from the shale.

The ammonia is a most valuable by-product of the distillation and may be utilized in the manufacture of commercial fertilizer or other foreign compounds, as the market demands. The United States Geological Survey has examined large areas of the shale in Colorado, Utah and Wyoming and has made many distillation tests. Some beds of shale that are several feet thick will yield more than a barrel of oil to the ton of shale, and one bed six inches thick will yield more than two barrels of crude oil to the ton of shale. One ton of this shale should therefore yield nearly 10 gallons of gasoline by the present commercial methods of gasoline extraction, and larger yields may be made possible by new methods.

Little attention has been paid to this shale because the quantity of

petroleum produced from wells in the United States has been sufficient to satisfy all demands, but for more than 50 years the oil shale industry of Scotland has been a very important one. In a recent year more than 8,000 men were employed in the industry in that country, yet the average yield of oil per ton of shale was much less than that which appears possible from the shale of Colorado and Utah. It is estimated that in Colorado alone there is sufficient shale, in beds three feet or more thick and richer than the shale being mined in Scotland, to yield twenty billion barrels of crude oil, from which at least two billion barrels of gasoline may be extracted by ordinary refining processes.

As was stated in the recent reply of Secretary Lane to a senate resolution on the subject of gasoline: "The development of this enormous reserve simply awaits the time when the price of gasoline or the demand for other distillation products warrants the utilization of this substitute source. This may happen in the future. At all events these shales likely to be drawn upon long before the exhaustion of the petroleum fields."
