PARCEL POST PATRONAGE

OFFICIAL REPORTS show that the masses are not making as much use of the parcel post as they should, says an exchange. This branch of the government postal service was organized for the use and benefit of the common people, and was only established after a long and hard fight. Therefore the public should ship all they can by the parcel post.

Although the government has established the parcel post, the express trust still keeps up its fight against the service. It is not an open fight, but one that is conducted in the dark. The postoffice bill has a joker in it. This joker prohibits the postmaster general from ever issuing orders which would permit the carrying of parcels weighing more than fifty pounds by the postal service. This will cripple the department and was, of course, placed in the bill by enemies of the people in the interest of the express trust.

The taxpayers of the country feel that they are entitled to relief from the exactions of monopolies. For years the express cormorant sapped the public. It charged enormous rates for hauling express matter, and the shippers were treated with supreme contempt. As soon, however, as the parcel post got into good working order, the express trust reduced its rates to meet the parcel post figures and the employees were instructed to treat the patrons as though they were at least human beings. This was a great consideration, and has been welcomed by shippers who patronize the express.

Shippers seem to overlook the fact that they can ship almost any article by parcel post and save time and money by doing so. The service is maintained for the benefit of the common people, and the service can only be successfully maintained by being properly patronized. If you have any doubts, give it a trial. Investigate and find out how you might utilize the parcel post to help your business.

Hi Johnson Running for President in Minnesota

ST. PAUL, Minn., March 14.—The progressive party technically had a candidate for president of the United States in the field at the Minnesota presidential preference primary today, but his name didn't get on the ballot. The man was Hiram Johnson, governor of California, whose name was filed by Minnesota progressives.

Minnesota law provides for seventeen delegates to the national progressive convention. Just that number filed for the places, obviating a contest. There was only one progressive presidential candidate. Hence, there being no contest in the progressive ranks, the entire progressive ticket was certified, and left off the ballot today. The presidential timber on the Minnesota ballot being used today follows:

Democratic—For president, Woodrow Wilson.

Republican—Senator Albert Cummins, Iowa; Henry D. Eastabrook, New York; William Grant Webster, Chicago.

Prohibitionist—For president, William Sulzer, New York; Eugene Foss, Massachusetts. For vice president, Frederick T. Wheeler, California; Ben B. Lindsey, Denver; Findley T. Hendrickson, Maryland.

Minnesota's first presidential preference primary went through today only after a fight in the supreme court. Under the law, delegates to national conventions must pledge their support to some officially recorded aspirant for the presidential nomination. Many prominently mentioned as presidential timber refused to permit their names to be filed on the Minnesota ballot. This eliminated any delegates who wanted to go to the national convention for them. It was upon this point in the law that the two supreme court attacks were made.

Charles E. Hughes, New York; **Theodore Roosevelt**, New York; **Ellihu Root**, New York, and **Hiram Johnson**, California, declined to permit their names to be used. Johnson's withdrawal got here too late.
