Most Famous Clown a Suicide



"SLIVERS" FRANK OAKLEY

"Slivers," one of the best known clowns the circus has produced, stuffed the door and window cracks of his room in a New York theatrical boarding house with rags the other day, and turned on the gas. He had been drinking heavily. "Slivers" was 45 years old. Born in Sweden, he was brought to this country a few months after his birth. His mother was a concert singer, and Oakley could not resist the temptation to appear on the "boards" in his own capacity, despite the objections of his family. When he was 14 years old he ran away from his home in Chicago. In a few years he was a performer with Andrew McDonald's circus, leaving that to spend two years at Ann Arbor at the request of his mother. He returned to the circus, and started on his rise to popularity. His nickname, "Slivers," came to him from his being so thin.

Strahorn Says Oregon's Future Is in Reclamation

PORTLAND, March 20.—The salvation of development in Oregon depends on the reclamation of lands in Central Oregon through the extension of state credits, said Robert E. Strahorn, railroad builder and promoter of the proposed Oregon, California & Eastern lines, at its meeting in the Oregon grill.

"The complacent lack of knowledge of conditions is the most distressing thing in connection with the problem," he said. "People are not at all familiar with the fact that land can be reclaimed cheaply in that district. I know of one marsh section that could be drained for an expense of \$10 an acre and at the same time be provided with irrigation at an expense of an additional \$10. Half the entire area could be irrigated at from \$25 to \$35 an acre."

"Nothing like that can be done in the western part of the state. Land is too expensive. A large part of the available land is logged off and in such condition that it will cost \$100 to \$200 an acre to clear it. Central Oregon is the only place for the poor man."

Mr. Strahorn took a hard rap at the recent Salem conference on rural credits, irrigation and drainage. He said that the controlling element was obsessed with the idea of rural credits and refused to let him and others who went there with the idea of presenting a plan for aiding in the development of the eastern and central parts of the state through irrigation have a chance to present their ideas.

He told of the hardships he was meeting in financing the Central Oregon railroad. He blamed this largely on Portland financial men who demand direct returns on their money rather than the indirect returns which would come to Portland and the state in general from a railway system that would link all the roads now tapping the edges of a great farming and stockraising district comprising an area equal to that of five Eastern states.

Barber, Millionaire Matchmaker, Founds "Greatest Farm College"

BARBERTON, O., March 20.—Ohio C. Barber, millionaire maker of matches, now 74 years of age, plans to make "the best farmers in the world" at the "greatest agricultural school in America." Barber is drawing plans to convert his famous \$3,000,000, 3,500 acre farm, Anna Dean, into an agricultural school adjunct to the Western Reserve University, Cleveland. According to Mr. Barber his institution will rival M. A. C., Illinois, Wisconsin, or Cornell in agricultural teaching and experimental work.

Barber's farm was named in honor of his first wife, Anna Dean. The farm is now operated with experts in charge of the various departments. It is stocked with 1,600 prize cattle and hogs. Barber will start the construction of dormitories this year. He will retain control of the institution until his death.

"I expect to live a long time yet," said Barber, who recently married his secretary, aged 35. "I want to live on the farm the rest of my life. I am a farmer first and last. I hope to have the new college under way within a year."
