MILITARY TRAINING IN SCHOOL

LAST Sunday the governors of the several states gave out the number of the national guards in their respective states, now ready for service. The figures are respectable, though they represent but a little more than one-seventh of one percent of the people. To prepare them, as they are now fitted for service, has cost the states comparatively little. Does not that carry a thought of value with it? There are no signs that the millennium is near.

An elementary military training is a great help to a man to make him a soldier of peace, even if he never sees a squadron set for war. Why not then give all the young men of the country such a training? By a little readjusting of our schools that training could be a part of the regular daily routine of a boy's duties after he reaches fourteen. Begun in the graded schools and continued through the high school course, the boys could receive the needed instruction without one of the demoralizing influences which attach to camps of regular armies. In that preliminary schooling it would be demonstrated which boys were natural soldiers, which should be sent for higher training by the government.

General Pleasanton once said that of a volunteer American army one-half were natural soldiers, and could swiftly be moulded into form; that half of the remainder could be made into good soldiers, but that the remainder might better be sent home at once as they never could be made real soldiers and would simply be in the way of the real soldiers.

A school training would reveal these and prevent their ever becoming officers and prevent their ever making the mistake of volunteering in the event of war.

The public and high schools are designed to give to the children of the country without distinction just as efficient a training for life's duties as possible. A preliminary military training for boys adds in every way to that efficiency, and it is time that the parents of the children understood that fact and demanded it.

AMERICA WON'T OPPOSE MEXICO

PRESIDENT SAYS NOTHING WILL BE DONE TO MAKE CARRANZA'S PATH ANY HARDER DURING THE PRESENT DIFFICULTY

United Press Service WASHINGTON, March 21.—President Wilson will do nothing in the Mexican situation to embarrass Carranza. He made it plain yesterday in a conference with Counsellor Folk of the state department that Carranza's wishes are to be met wherever possible in the present activity. No demand will be made for the right to use the Mexican Northwest to transport supplies if Carranza does not desire it. However, a favorable answer is expected. Queretaro wires that Carranza is satisfied with the conduct of the American expedition. Government representatives report the border country as quiet.

SUDAN GRASS IS OFFERED FARMERS

CONGRESSMAN WILL SEND GRASS AND DRY LAND ALFALFA SEED FREE IF REQUESTS FOR THIS ARE MADE AT ONCE

Congressman Nick Sinnott still has 100 packages of Sudan grass seed left for distribution, also a dozen or so packages of dry land alfalfa and field peas, which he will send out to those first applying for same, one package to each person, as the regulation requires.

The bureau of plant industry informed him recently that no more seeds would be sent out after March 15, but he succeeded in getting an extension of this time to April 1. Requests for this seed must be in his hands on April 1 or the department will not send the same out.

OHIO SUFFRAGISTS BEGIN ANOTHER BATTLE TODAY

United Press Service COLUMBUS, O., March 20.—Ohio suffragists, bent on vengeance for the pigeon-holing by the congressional judiciary committee of the Susan B. Anthony national suffrage amendment, met here today. Women representing each of Ohio's twenty-two congressional districts announced the following plans:

To resurrect the Anthony amendment and force a vote in congress through pressure on every Ohio congressman. To boost membership of the Ohio suffrage organization to 500,000. Suffrage leaders here today claim that when their organization reaches a membership of 500,000 they will submit another amendment for suffrage in Ohio. The organization now numbers about 300,000. Leaders said that if they can get the half million members needed, an amendment for state suffrage will be submitted next fall, although it was decided in convention recently to wait another year before trying again.

NORTH DAKOTA PRIMARY TODAY IS FIGHT FOR DELEGATESHIP

United Press Service BISMARCK, N. D., March 21.—North Dakota's presidential preference primary today developed into a fight for positions as delegates. There was no fight for the head of the ticket. Twenty-seven democrats sought to go to St. Louis, all pledged to Woodrow Wilson. Other fights were equally interesting. Wilson was

the only democratic presidential candidate.

Henry D. Eastbrooke, New York, was the sole nominee of the republicans, although he did not have the support of the old guard republicans, who were noncommittal. Progressive republicans went to the polls with Senator Robert LaFollette of Wisconsin at the head of their ticket. Arthur Lesuer, Minot, N. D., was the sole socialistic candidate.
