TOO MUCH FEUDALISM

JUST who shot Mrs. Alma Kuehne in the battle at Dodd Hollow last December is a much mooted question right now, and the task up to the jury is by no means an easy one. But the fact remains, no matter how the jury decides who did the shooting, that Mrs. Kuehne came to her death from a bullet fired by another. The fact also that the lives of several were endangered, and that is remarkable, with all the shooting witnesses have told occurred at the disputed homestead, that there were no more casualties.

From the details of Dodd Hollow life being brought out in testimony law and order do not seem to stand high in the minds of some of the Dodd Hollowites. Guns seemed apparently an essential part of every man's apparel, and threats, fights and gun plays are freely mentioned.

Perhaps the airing of all of this in court will have a tendency to discourage such feudal practices in that section. It is sad to think, though, that it takes a battle of such magnitude to bring about this change for the better.

Jess Willard Has Advantage of Height and Reach Over Moran

NEW YORK, March 22.—Towering five inches above his huge adversary and possessing a reach five and one-half inches longer, Jess Willard has two of the great defensive works known to boxing thrown up around his precious jaw-bone. If Frank Moran, a comparative midget, is to hang flowers and ivy on Willard's nether maxillary he will have to fairly leap in the air. Six feet seven inches is the altitude of Big Jess. Moran's red thatch stands a mere six feet one inch above the caloused soles of his battleship feet. And before he gets near enough to start availing toward Willard's classic features the boy from Pittsburgh must wade through a mass of arms 33 1/2 inches long. He works under a handicap right there, for his own arms are only 78 inches long, a right respectable pair of snails in ordinary circles but puny outworks in Willard's gigantic company. One of Moran's favorite modes of battle bespeaks the craft of the former globe trotter. His watchers have found

that Moran likes to work his man into a crouching attitude, draw down his arms with a poke at the body and then swing over the old right-hand wallop to the jaw. The odds are that he can't do that with Willard. Big Jess fought a safe battle against Jack Johnson, standing almost upright throughout, with his arms extended far in front of him in excellent blocking formation. He refused to crouch and take a chance on meeting up with marauding haymakers brought up from the floor. His personal disposition, too, may stand Willard in good stead in the seventy thousand dollar skit, for he is not a belligerent type, preferring to let the other fellow ram his face against the outstretched Willard mitts. Moran's two knockouts over Jim Coffey demonstrated his punching ability more decisively than any of his other performances. True, there are those who suspect the tint of the Corkonian's vertebrae but none who saw the jolts go home had any lingering doubts of the drive that impelled

them. In the second fight Moran swept over his right with the force of a mule's hind tootale. Right away the bells began to tinkle in Coffey's steeple and he remained away picking daisies for a considerable period of time. Those who know fighting and fighters recall the fate of little Tommy Burns, perhaps the hoariest bit of frost that ever clung to the championship landscape. He went against Jack Johnson under a similar handicap and like Fainting Bertha, never had a chance. Burns was five feet seven inches tall and Johnson's height was six feet, one-fourth of an inch. Despite the difference in height, Burns had it on the gloomy exile in reach. His arms were 74 1/2 inches long and Johnson's only 73. Johnson weighed 220 and Burns 179 in that fight, but Moran has proved that weights don't amount to much when fighters get above the 175-pound mark. As Willard weighs about fifty-seven pounds more than Moran, perhaps it is just as well for the challenger to stick to his contention.

EVANGELISTS DRAW CROWDS

MATHIS AND VESSEY FILL THE PAVILION TO CAPACITY WITH THEIR SERVICES—PAY A VISIT TO HIGH SCHOOL

Eight hundred people attended the services at the Pavilion last night and listened to a powerful sermon by Evangelist Mathis upon the text found in John 14:30, "The prince of this world cometh and hath nothing in me." These were the words of Jesus in His last talk with the apostles. The sermon was founded upon the three trial temptations of Jesus. The first temptation, that to make a stone bread, was intended to shake Jesus' confidence in God. The one who yields to such a temptation is a pessimist, about the worst thing the devil has made.

The second temptation, that of leaping from the pinnacle, was taken to illustrate the extreme optimism who is the religionist who goes off on an "ism." He is like a little switch engine that puffs and whistles on a sidetrack, thinking it the whole road.

or a dog to whom the butcher has thrown a bone, who thinks he has the whole shop and runs off down the alley chased by other dogs, and finally lies down to chew his bone while the rare steaks hang in the shop.

The third temptation was self ease and the evangelist declared that sins of omission are as bad as those of commission. On sins of commission the statement was made that every man or woman who enters Klamath Falls comes to make it better or worse, and those who just before they leap off into eternity look back to see their paths strewn with slime and wrecked lives were vividly portrayed.

The singing is becoming a great feature of the services and many remain after dismissal to listen to the chorus of 125 voices sing the inspiring gospel songs. Some of the best voices in the city are in the choir. Mrs. Vessey seems always at her best at the piano and she and Mr. Vessey are getting into the hearts of all who meet them. Mr. Vessey sings each night and usually renders a cornet solo.

At the high school yesterday he was repeatedly encoined and Mr. Mathis was enthusiastically applauded upon his speech upon giants in our lives. The ministerial association accompanied the evangelist party in their visit to the high school and enjoyed the singing and speech.

Tomorrow night the subject of the sermon will be, "Old Debts and Bad Feelings."

The audiences are increasing each night and people are beginning to come into town from as far out as Poe Valley to attend. The audience room, which is arranged to seat 800 people, was well filled last night while there were 125 in the choir.

The sermons are coming to be repeatedly interrupted with applause, and the fact that this is gained without personalities and by straight gospel preaching speaks great things in prophecy for the meeting and for the power and kindly spirit of the evangelist.

New Co-Operation in a Plan to Keep Men Busy

An item of considerable interest to every employer of labor in Oregon and Southern Washington is an announcement of the consolidation of the working interest of the Oregon branch of the federal employment office and the public employment bureau of the city of Portland.

The two offices and trained corps of workers in charge of same will co-operate in an effort to bring together the employer seeking help and the worker seeking employment.

It will also be their further object to exploit the state's resources by getting men and women into the channel of industry where they are most needed and to secure them work for which they are best suited.

Another matter worthy of note in this connection is that this is the first practical combination ever attempted between the employment branch of the federal government and any other public employment office. Results of the work are to come under the close scrutiny of the officials at Washington, and may be the basis for a combination of these interests throughout the United States.

The government employment service is a national affair with branches in every important city in the United States. Through an interchange of information between these numerous offices correct data concerning labor conditions in any locality is always available.

Portland, being the largest city in the section mentioned, is the natural labor market to which all classes of laborers and trained workers flock when seeking employment.

The public employment bureau maintained and operated by the city

of Portland ranks as one of the most important labor exchanges on the Pacific Coast, and has, previous to its alliance with the federal office, been a clearing-house for the unemployed for a large section of the Northwest.

The combination of these two great factors, specializing in the matter of getting the employer and the employee together, will be effective of much economy and its operating efficiency is obvious. It is the prime object of these offices to promote an equitable and economic distribution of available labor forces, and afford all employers the opportunity to secure quickly and without cost of cost help from a responsible and permanently established source.

The matter of supplying help to employers remote from the established labor markets will be a strong feature. Particular attention will also be given the matter of serving farmers, ranchers, orchardists, stockmen, canners, logging camps, lumber mills and manufacturers, throughout Oregon and a large portion of Southern Washington.

It will not be the purpose of these employment offices to supply all the jobs with men from Portland, but rather the labor situation in each community will be investigated to the end of making an equitable and economic distribution of the workers involved.

The services rendered by the combined employment bureaus will be free to all who wish to avail themselves of them. No charges will be exacted from employer or employee.

Applications from employers for help and from those seeking employment are invited.
