Caring for War Orphans Is Business of Little Town

WORKINGHAM, England, March 22.—This little English market town is the nation's haven for motherless and fatherless war children. Hundreds of juvenile innocents whose fathers are buried in France have found new homes here. Almost every housewife in Workingham has a new baby. She probably has adopted it, thanks to the war.

The nuns at the Workingham convent are busy, too, for every child who is old enough is a pupil at the convent school. In some cases the father is dead but the mother still lives.

Little Tommy Hadley, aged six, is a notable example. His father was a private in the South Lancashire regiment and he was killed early in the war. Since that time Tommy's mother has been ill, so the Children's Aid society sent Tommy to Workingham. He has a foster mother who clothes him and gets him ready to

go to school every morning. One of the older orphans calls for Tommy and other boy and girl orphans. By the time she arrives at the convent she has a happy string of charges ready for the day's lessons.

Many of Workingham's orphans whose fathers and mothers are both gone are permanently installed in Workingham homes. They have changed their names and will grow up with "regular" fathers and mothers. Some of the children are only motherless. The father is still fighting somewhere in the war. If he comes back, which perhaps he will not, the child may leave Workingham. But in the other event there will be a new adoption in some Workingham home.

BIGGER THE FEED, THE MORE COATS

MONTENEGROIN COURT ATTACHES PUT ON EXTRA COAT FOR EVERY FUNCTION, WEARING SEVERAL AT ONCE

BERLIN, March 3.—(By mail)—John B. Jackson, former American minister to the Balkans, now attached to the embassy in Berlin, tells of his meeting with the old King of Montenegro in Cetinjs.

"In Montenegro," Jackson said, all officials wear blue shirts every day and over these, blue coats. When they go to the palace on ordinary business they slip on a green coat over the blue one, but at royal dinners they put on a white coat over the blue and green ones.

"That evening I dined with His Majesty, I was on one side and the foreign minister was on the other. All of us had on the regulation three coats. As the dinner progressed we got warmer and warmer and finally the old king said: 'Mr. Minister, you get on one side and Mr. Jackson on the other and help peel me out of this white coat. It is too short.'"

BIRD PROTECTION WOULD SAVE FARMERS MILLIONS IN CROPS

WINNIPEG, Man., March 22.—Game preservation in Manitoba, North Dakota and Minnesota was argued here today by the Audubon society. Declaring that it represented "the 96 per cent of the population that does not shoot prairie chickens," the society asks for laws protecting the bird whose eggs, it says, have largely been destroyed by frost. The protection of plover, woodcocks, snipes and sand pipers would save American agriculture \$80,000,000 a year the society says, because these creatures live on seeds and insects.
