COMMUNITY COMFORT STATIONS

ONLY a moment's consideration is necessary to reach an appreciation of the need of a community comfort station; the wonder is that this need should so long have been ignored. In communities that now possess comfort stations the different members of the farmers' families say, "Meet me at the comfort station, or the community rest room when you are ready to go home." Agricultural exhibits, farmers' meetings, community club meetings, dinners and scores of other public functions have in the rest room exactly the place needed.

The cost of this facility for any community is so small and its value so great that any community that goes without shows very shortsighted business and social policy. It pays in money, in social development, in cultivating the get-together and boosting spirit and in all the ways that relate to community building.

The old town hall used to serve a somewhat similar purpose in days gone by, as did the "old inn," but nowadays the community comfort station has advantages without number over these prototypes. If a group of merchants in any town could but know in advance what a transformation a community rest room will effect in the spirit of their customers, especially in their feelings toward the town and its places of business, they would start out instantly to secure for their community this modern facility.

To get the rest room is easy; to maintain it is not a great financial burden, and its value to the community will greatly outweigh its cost. It is to be hoped that all communities will early realize the importance of providing their rural citizen with this needed facility. It certainly behooves those local merchants whose trade already is cut into by the mail order houses to adopt every means within their reach to encourage farmers to visit their towns and their places of business. The rest room is one of the most potent influences that can be called into service for this purpose, and to secure it should be the purpose of all boosters for home trade.

TODAY'S ODDEST STORY

SAN DIEGO, March 22.—Mr. Lucas of biblical note, has nothing on Anselmo Sosa of San Diego. About 1902, he mysteriously left his wife and disappeared. The President Cannot Control His Party

(Special Correspondence)

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 22.—The votes taken in the house on the several questions connected with the McLeMure resolution reveal that the president cannot command the strength of his party and that if he is to be supported in matters of legislation and policy it must be by republican co-operation.

The issue on which these votes were taken was raised by the president himself, who, with a tactlessness unusual even for him, undertook to dictate to the house committee on rules a procedure regarding a resolution which was in the hands of altogether another committee. The episode, from beginning to end, was a demonstration of the disregard which democratic congressmen have for Mr. Wilson.

To begin with, the committee refused to present the question to the house in the manner which Mr. Wilson outlined—and there never was an opportunity for a clean-cut division on the vital issue in the controversy. The real issue was whether the president was right in demanding that congress should not express an opinion warning Americans not to travel on armed merchant vessels. Congress has never voted on this question, because the committee presented an entirely different question, namely, whether the McLeMure resolution containing such a warning should be laid on the table and never brought to a vote.

On this question two record votes were obtained in the house—the first on a parliamentary detail of procedure and the second on the question

of such an indefinite manner of disposing of the question.

On the first of these tests, twenty-one democrats took an attitude and voted in defiance of what the administration spokesman declared to be the president's wishes. On the second test, thirty-three democrats remained obdurate. The republicans who came to the president's aid on these questions numbered sixty-three and ninety-three, respectively.

Here was an issue raised by the president himself. In it was involved the strength of the community of sentiment between him and his party in congress. It was, in addition, a question in which a grave national policy was involved. If ever a time arose in congress when a president could hope to have at his back the united strength of his own party, this was the time.

Yet in congress where a democratic majority of twenty-four is to be counted, the effectiveness of that majority was destroyed by flat rebellion—and but for the aid of his political opponents, the president would have been utterly routed.

The result bodes no good to the program of legislation on other subjects which the president has in mind. The outcome of the debate and vote on the McLeMure resolution is to intensify the hostility of many democrats to the head of their party. Mr. Wilson cannot hope now to secure partisan control of congress on any question of importance. The whip hand is now held by republicans—who will henceforth control this congress in fact as they will control the next congress in name and in fact.
