CENTRAL OREGON DEVELOPMENT

Synopsis of Robert E. Strahorn's Speech Before Portland Realty Board

OREGON'S hope of any early and large agricultural expansion lies wholly east of the Cascades. There is no considerable area of land available to the poor settler west of the mountains. The only real offer we have to make to farmers with small capital is on logged-off lands, and this suggestion is unfortunately disposed of by the cost of from \$75 to \$150 an acre for clearing alone, as compared with \$20 to \$40 an acre for drained and irrigated lands east of the mountains, or the few dollars for millions of acres of productive dry land homesteads.

The area of Eastern Oregon is 60,000 square miles and of Western Oregon 35,000. The total tillable area east of the Cascades is 16,000,000 acres, and west of the Cascades 6,000,000. Of Central Oregon's tillable area of 10,000,000 acres only 5 per cent is really cultivated, while of Western Oregon's tillable area easily available, probably less than 75 per cent is cultivated.

Our towns are notoriously overbuilt and our country is correspondingly empty. Sixty per cent of Oregon's people live in our towns, and of Oregon's increase of 259,000 people in the last decade, 213,000 came to the cities and only 46,000 to the country. In the state of Washington, two-thirds of the people live east of the mountains building up the cities on the Coast. In Oregon, three-fourths are west of the mountains, mainly living off each other.

While Eastern Oregon has only 900 miles of railway, Eastern Washington has 2,100 miles, its building greatly stimulated in the beginning by the aggressive citizenship of Seattle and Spokane. These modest beginnings blossomed out into five transcontinental railroads across Eastern Washington compared with only one across Eastern Oregon, and unfortunately our single transcontinental railroad skirts only the extreme northern and eastern limits of the state. The territory east of the Cascades in Washington will not average any better than that east of the mountains in Oregon. We have as large an arable area, as much diversity in farm products, a much greater livestock industry, and vastly greater timber resources. Also a better mineral country with a larger precious metal yield. Eastern Oregon dry lands average just as good as those of the Big Bend in Washington, and our irrigated area of over 1,000,000 acres compares favorably with the similar country in our neighboring state. Irrigation and drainage have brought great wealth to every far Western state. There is no agriculture in Colorado, Utah, Arizona, New Mexico and Nevada without irrigation. It has there stimulated the building of many thousands of miles of railways. We must have a fair measure of it in Central Oregon to encourage railway building there.

The five counties of Central Oregon with which I am particularly concerned are as big as Maryland, Vermont, Massachusetts, New Jersey and Connecticut combined. Only some of them are reached at their outer edges by rail. No less an authority than James J. Hill five years ago prophesied for them a population of half a million by this time. While they doubtless have the resources to justify his opinion, their population has only reached about 10 per cent of these figures. When he uttered this prophecy he of course had in view the great railway development then promised. It was not made and while he may have been over-enthusiastic, I have no doubt that a quarter of a million people there would be swelling the commerce of Portland today if those railway extensions had been made. This would fill our empty buildings and stimulate every line of business.

You will therefore best help yourselves by extending your hands and sympathy to those brave pioneers struggling against great odds in Central Oregon. You have no question before you half so big as the reclamation and adequate railway development of that territory. In fact, I do not believe that all your public problems and activities put together are equal to this one great, overshadowing problem of railway development of Central Oregon. I am asked whether it would take some business away from Portland to San Francisco, Salt Lake and elsewhere. The best of that business is lost to those cities now. Much of this would be recovered by the completion of the proposed lines of the Oregon, California & Eastern railway, and for every dollar's worth that would go out to those distant cities, one hundred dollars' worth would be created for Portland as a result of the great development of all resources.
