years ago "Peg" Oswalt, 23, watched Mt. Union college baseball men and gridders at their daily practice. "Peg" often expressed the wish that some day he would be the greatest athlete in Ohio. But "Peg," having only one leg, realized his inability to become Ohio's greatest two-legged athlete. So he set out to become America's greatest one-legged athlete. He is that today. Oswalt plays football, baseball and basketball, and can roller skate. His lone left leg has stood him in good stead in many a hard-fought athletic contest when he competed against able-bodied two-legged men, and did not suffer by comparison.

"Peg" learned to pole himself on his crutches, and he can kick off as well as the best two-legged players in football. His crutches are used only in starting the game. As soon as the ball goes sailing through the air he throws them away and hops with as much speed as many gridders attain on two good legs.

Last fall "Peg" played right guard on the strong Alliance Independent team, which went the whole season without a single defeat. It is a matter of local football history that Oswalt in a game with Canton last November leaped through the line and stopped a terrific tandem plunge when Canton had the ball on the one-yard line ready to back it over on the last down. Oswalt played in every game.

New Type of Zeppelin Is Easier to Manage

AMSTERDAM, March 30.—The Zeppelin has been vastly improved lately. There is no doubt that the Germans take it very seriously as a fighting machine. Still greater aerial activity on their part may be expected soon.

The prediction is that of a neutral, recently arrived from Germany, where he had an opportunity to see and hear much concerning the Kaiser's plans for air raiding, but whose name, for obvious reasons, cannot be published.

According to his account the newest Zeppelins are much longer and narrower than its predecessors, the latest form having proved more readily manageable in heavy weather. The gondolas hang much deeper than formerly, and a bridge connects them. Both gondolas and the bridge is metal plated, in the hope that they may prove bullet proof.

Each new Zeppelin carries about ten machine guns and two or three small cannons. Formerly the cannons

were mounted on special platforms. It was found, however, that these were often hit, diminishing the craft's efficiency; so at present both machine guns and cannons are inside the gondolas, protected by thick steel plates.

Several new bomb-throwing devices have been adopted. An equipment has also been provided for pouring out poisonous gases upon enemies.

The improved type of air ship is built almost entirely of a combination of aluminum and steel, the rudders have been much simplified and the motors are far more powerful than the older ones.

The Friedrichshafen plant has been increased fully 100 times in size and the number of employees has been multiplied by at least twenty. By April the Germans expect to be able to send three Zeppelins to the front weekly.

The Paravel and Schutte-Loss factories are said also to have increased their output at least ten times.

In many German quarters the belief is said to be that air craft will prove the war's deciding factor.
