them closed as long as the payments provided for are made.

Sixth—The United States will provide water service to the Van Brimmer system not to exceed 50 second feet.

Seventh—The United States will not be obligated to construct any portion of the system required for the irrigation or drainage of the marsh lands nor to operate or maintain such works, nor to expend any further sum toward the reclamation of the marshes, nor will the United States assume any responsibility for the success of their reclamation.

It is hoped that all concerned will give their hearty co-operation in this matter, so that the gates can be closed at the earliest possible moment. If they can be closed within the next twenty or thirty days the evaporation will dry up the marshes by August 30th.

EDUCATORS TO DISCUSS ART AND THE GARY SYSTEM

CHICAGO, April 1.—Educators from all over the country, especially from Middle Western states, came to Chicago today in the interest of vocational education. The annual convention of the Vocational Education Association of the Middle West began a three days' meeting.

Every phase of vocational learning will be discussed. Art will receive an unusual share of attention and the Gary school system will be discussed as a vocational system. Tomorrow morning, the delegates will visit the Chicago schools.

Among the speakers are: Professor Christie, Purdue University; Lucinda W. Prince, director School of Salesmanship, Boston; Messrs. Wulfinck and Swartz, Gary, Ind.; Superintendent Hughes, Syracuse; Principal Grady, of the New York city schools, who represents the Ettinger system; Charles A. Prosser, director of Dunwoody Institute, Minneapolis and secretary of the National Society for the Promotion of Industrial Education; and Superintendent John D. Shoop.

PAPER PRINTS PREDICTION OF WAR'S END BY JUNE 17TH

LONDON, April 1.—An English army officer was starting for the front last year. He called at the bank to settle up certain affairs before departing.

"You'll be back soon with a wounded hand," said the bank manager. He was. His wound healed, the officer made ready to go back to the front. Meeting the bank manager, he inquired: "Any more predictions?"

"You'll be gone longer this time," said the manager, "and when you do return, it will be with quite a bad wound in the leg."

This also happened. The officer was much surprised. Hunting up the banker, he inquired: "Since you are so wise, why can't you tell me when the war will end?"

"It will end," said the manager, "on June 17, 1916, but I shan't live to see it. I'll just about live until New Year's day and not much more."

He died January 2d.

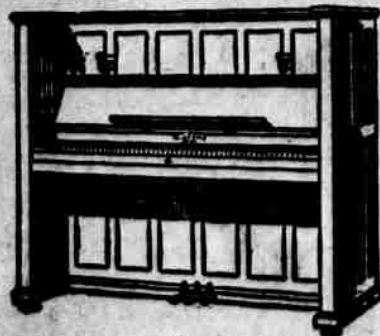

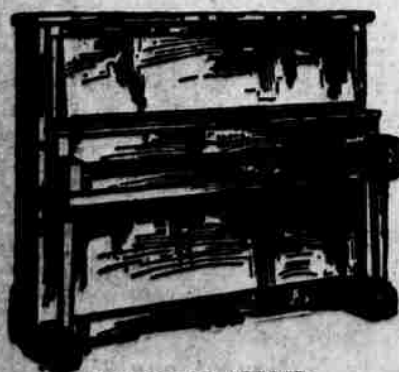
