DEVELOPING THE YOUNG

NOBODY nowadays will argue that young people do not engage in business early enough in life; the chief defect in present practice is not that they enter too late, or that they lack native ability. Rather, it is that they enter into the work without definite notions of what they wish to do and without any special training for doing it. Everybody who has employed young persons must have observed that in general they either have no knowledge of or training in business or that whatever training and the knowledge they have has been acquired as a sort of afterthought, not as a part of a well thought plan of fitting themselves for life work.

Efficiency nowadays is the watchword, and it probably is a much overworked as well as a much abused word. Yet only the plainest kind of common sense should lead one to suppose that if a boy is to engage in a business his training should be designed to make him capable and efficient in that business. It should not be left to chance to determine what his vocation shall be, and he should not be obliged to shift from one vocation to another through the most productive years of his life, because he has no fixed purpose and no special training.

Of course nobody can even estimate the number of percentage of persons of average intelligence who go through their lives without any definite goal in view, but the percentage must be large. Certainly in almost every field one may find persons who have worked at one period or another in dozens of lines of business; yet everybody knows that every change made from one line of business to another is at a loss of time and a waste of effort to both employer and employee. The annual losses due to this cause must be enormous, and they are all due to the fact that workers do not really know, perhaps they do not even care, what line of business they are best fitted for.

Inasmuch as the business world is vitally concerned in the training of the persons that enter it by thousands each year it is entirely appropriate that its influence should be exerted in behalf of all movements designed to train the young people of the nation for future usefulness. The interests of business cannot be separated from those of citizenship, and therefore training for civic duties should be combined with business training. Effective instrumentalities for providing training of this sort are the commercial organizations of the country, and many of them are doing splendid work for their young people by means of junior civic leagues, chambers of commerce and business men's clubs. Every community should organize its young people for civic service, and should undertake to fit them for useful and profitable employment in the business world.

WAR DECLARED ON THE "PEACE HAT"



War on the "peace hat," a late creation in spring millinery, is an imminent possibility. Women friends of the birds declare the dove with which the hat is trimmed must go before they will set the hat on their fair heads. They are for peace, they declare, but they say they will not advertise their principles at the price of an innocent bird's life.

Privately, those who are advocating the wearing of the "peace hat" have confessed that the alleged "dove" is not a "real-for-sure" dove at all. They say it is made of chicken feathers. Nevertheless the bird champions declare it looks like a real dove and they will not wear it. So there!

The subject has been brought to the attention of the National Association of Audubon Societies of America, the last authority on bird protection. The society is making a vigorous fight against the use of bird plumage for hat trimmings. Secretary Pearson says if the alleged bird is the body of a real dove, the Audubon authorities certainly are against its use in millinery.

"As long as they make these 'doves' out of the feathers of domestic birds, there can certainly be no objection, to women wearing them," said Mr. Pearson, "unless perhaps it may be said that by doing so, they are encouraging the general subject on feather-wearing."

"The feathers of wild birds cannot

be obtained unless birds are killed," said Mr. Pearson, "and therefore should never be worn; on the other hand, ostrich plumes are legitimate as well as beautiful decorations and are approved by the Audubon societies."

"To permit the use of doves for the adornment of women's hats, however, means the destruction of thousands of doves, which are of inestimable value to the farmer as weed eradicators. Recent examinations by the United States department of agriculture on the stomachs of 237 doves showed that the principal and almost constant diet is the seeds of weeds, eaten at all seasons of the year."

"The fight against the 'peace hat' and the use of doves for millinery purposes resolves itself into a question of dollars and cents to the farmer. If each dove at each meal destroys 7,500 weed seeds, as the above examination showed, and thus prevents the growth of the same number of prospective weeds, how much good will all the doves on a farm, or in a state, or in the country at large accomplish?"

"Is there a farmer in the country who, after a hard day's work with hoe or cultivator, has not wished that some other means could be devised to prevent the rapid growth of noxious weeds, and at the same time emancipate him from the sweating brow, the blistered hands and the aching back. The dove is one of the answers."

The large crowd that assembled at the Pavilion last night is indicative of the interest in the Mathis-Vessey evangelistic meetings that has been developed here.

Mr. Mathis' sermon was upon the story of Esther going before the king to plead for her people, and was directed principally to the members of the various churches of the city, respecting their relations to the churches they represent and to the other members. At the close of the service about 200 church members remained to meet Mr. Mathis in a conference in which plans for the remainder of the series of meetings were perfected.
