MATTER MAY BE PUT UP TO THE PROPERTY OWNERS AT A SPECIAL ELECTION IN A SHORT TIME

A special election for voting bonds for the sewerage of Second Hot Springs addition and Mills addition is desired by residents of that section. The matter was presented to the council last night.

F. W. Hyndman, who was spokesman for those seeking the improvement, requested that the matter be placed upon the ballot at the general election, like the municipal highway. The time for doing this, however, has expired.

Data regarding the improvements, its cost, and similar details, will be presented at the next meeting of the council. At that time, the proper ordinance creating the sewer district, etc. will be considered.
