SALEM, April 13.—"From letters which I am receiving, it is clear that the people of Oregon are anxious to see the irreducible school fund of this state receive a large share of the fund derived from the Oregon & California railroad land grant," said State Superintendent of Public Instruction Churchill in commenting upon a letter writing campaign he inaugurated when the press dispatches first announced that the clause in the Chamberlain bill, relating to the fund, was in danger of amendment.

state had an adequate irreducible school fund, it would materially reduce the taxes in all parts of the state, and would affect every citizen in Oregon. No other plan proposed for the distribution of this money would come so near affecting every man, woman and child in Oregon as that of using the fund which would take care of the maintenance of our schools."

Superintendent Churchill's letter campaign against an amendment of the clause of the Chamberlain bill giving the school fund 40 per cent has extended to the first class school districts, the county superintendents, commercial clubs, parent-teachers' associations, civic bodies and school boards, and he is pleased with the response. Most of them have either written or telegraphed to the Oregon representatives in Washington, he said.

WOULD CONTINUE THE RABIES FIGHT

WORK THIS YEAR UNDER THE DIRECTION OF THE CALIFORNIA STATE BOARD OF HEALTH HAS BEEN EFFECTIVE

SACRAMENTO, April 13.—Due to the campaign against the coyotes, the principal carriers of rabies, the animals generally are becoming scarce throughout the country, according to the report of Edward T. Ross, state sanitary inspector. Generally the citizens in the infected districts seem well pleased with the work accomplished; so well pleased that hearing efforts in this line were to be abandoned, the residents of Modoc and Lassen counties have petitioned the state board of health to continue the fight against coyotes.

The petition, which contains the names of the most prominent sheep and stock men of the northeast, county officials, bankers, officers of the Wool Growers Association, recites that there is every need to continue the campaign against rabies, as there is more danger of infection with the arrival of warm weather, when the stock is turned out on the ranges.

Reports for March, just received by the state board of health, show that during the month there were killed by hunters in Modoc and Lassen counties using government or state poison or traps, 806 coyotes. In the same period there were killed 109 dogs, 90 bobcats, 93 polecats. For bait there were used 1120 rabbits, 356 ground squirrels and 210 magpies. A total of 1,217 traps were put out. During March suspected rabies was reported in the case of 89 cattle, six hogs, six sheep, nine dogs, 22 coyotes and 10 horses.

Portable Phone to Be a Part of Ranger's Outfit

A portable telephone, made of aluminum and weighing 3 1/2 pounds, designed by Forest Officer R. B. Adams of Missoula, Mont., will be part of the regular equipment of patrolmen on the national forests during the coming field season. In fact, 100 of these instruments have already been received in Portland, and will be distributed for use this summer on the government forests of Oregon and Washington.

This instrument is regarded as a great improvement over the set formerly used, which weighed 10 pounds. It is said that a field man equipped with this new telephone, a few yards of light emergency wire, and a short piece of heavy wire to make ground connection, can cut in anywhere along the 20,000 miles or more of forest service lines, and get in touch with the headquarters of a supervisor or a district ranger. To talk, one end of the emergency wire is thrown over the telephone wire, the two ends are connected to the portable instrument and the instrument is connected to the ground wire, the end of which must be thrown into the damp earth or into water. Contact with the line wire is

made possible by removal of the insulation from a few inches of the emergency wire. The Adams instrument does not ring the bell of the receiving telephone, but instead it causes a sizzling sound from a small megaphone-shaped apparatus known as the "howler."

Thorough tests of the instrument have been made this spring on both the Cascade and Whitman national forests of Oregon, and the results were very satisfactory, even on a 100-mile stretch. Forest officers say these portable telephones will be especially valuable in reporting fires and other emergencies, and will supplement, in many ways, the regular telephones installed at lookout points and ranger stations.
