Decreased Wheat Crop Causes Consternation

(Continued from page 1)

smallest in years as far as wheat is concerned. A considerable portion of the land usually sown to wheat will be planted to oats, but accurate reports regarding this are not yet obtainable.

From over 200 special corn correspondents located in practically every growing district in the Northwest, returns indicate that the area of winter wheat available at this time for the coming harvest is showing a total of but 2,075,000 acres compared with a showing at this time in 1915 of 2,450,000 acres.

The spring planting returns of the three states indicate a total area of 1,340,000 acres compared with 1,390,000 acres in 1915. Therefore, the total spring area planted is showing a heavy decrease from a year ago instead of the increase expected earlier as a result of the smaller sowing.

Total area planted to wheat in the three states for the 1916 crop reaches 3,415,000 acres, compared with 3,840,000 acres in 1915 and 3,827,000 acres in 1914. Therefore, the present crop area is the smallest in three years.

On the face of these figures of the wheat acreage, it would look as if the Pacific Northwest is doomed to produce one of the smallest wheat crops in many years. This is rather severe, and is not exactly a fact. The condition of the planting is somewhat better than normal in the three states. This is especially true of the light land sections, which this season have apparently an over-abundance of moisture. This means that Oregon, with a greater percentage of light land sowing than either Idaho or Washington, will fare somewhat better and will bring the total crop in this state to within a fraction of a year ago.

On the basis of normal production on the acreage indicated, the wheat crop in Oregon now looks like 20,000,000 bushels; Idaho 11,000,000 bushels and Washington 35,000,000 bushels—a grand total of 66,000,000 bushels. The last returns of the 1915 crop showed a grand total of 71,000,000 bushels.

Second Unit to Get Water Upon Rental Basis Again

A letter from the director and chief engineer advises that the public notice for the second unit which includes the lands in Poe Valley, Nuss Lake and under the Griffith Canal cannot be issued this spring, hence water delivery for these lands on a rental basis for the season of 1916.

Terms and conditions will be the same as in 1915, \$1 per acre foot, payable in advance. The old contracts were only for 1914 and 1915, hence all persons who wish water for the coming season must come to the office and sign up new contracts. Before the delivery of water, payment must be made in advance for that irrigation.
