A REAL INVESTMENT

KLAMATH FALLS residents are an optimistic people, about the most optimistic to be found in the West. Instead of bewailing the lack of this, or the need of that, they look beyond, and see the busy community to come. When railroads make it possible to develop industries as yet unestablished, when the air will be re-sound with the busy hum of saws and other woodworking machinery, making business hum also by reason of big payrolls.

But why wait for the future? Why not get busy now, and improve business conditions by bringing the trade of the employees of sawmills already here into Klamath Falls. At Shipington and Pelican City, the industries now working there are paying over \$50,000 a month to employees. Let us get the full benefit of this payroll for Klamath Falls, and thereby better the condition of every resident.

The matter of building a well improved road to Shipington, with branch roads to reach Pelican City and the Upper Lake landings will be before the property owners at the May election. The cost of the project is to be not more than \$20,000, this to be paid in three years by the city. The cost to the individual property owner will not be over 2 1/2 mills, or about 25 cents on a valuation of \$100.

Isn't that a pretty cheap means of adding real value to your property? Can you afford to oppose such an infinitesimal expenditure when by so doing you shut off a steady stream of money that is bound to repay your little outlay many fold? Assuredly, you cannot; and still lay claim to any business sense.

But pray do not stop at a decision to vote "yes" on this matter. Do a little real boosting for Klamath Falls by showing other property owners the short-sightedness of holding up the growth of prosperity here through opposing such a universally beneficial measure.

Let's build the Municipal Highway, and connect Klamath Falls with the payroll.
