Moving Pictures

"The Horrors of War" will be shown at the Orpheus theater tonight only. The remarkable feature of this picture is the stress laid upon battle's immediate results instead of the usual emphasis on the maneuvers of preparation. The opening scenes show the bombardment of a Turkish town by the Russian fleet in the Black Sea. This remarkable view was taken from the deck of a Russian battleship and the details of loading the huge guns, firing them, and watching the results of their deadly accuracy are all horribly apparent. A whole town bursts into flames, and a new target is sought. A steamer is sighted in the distance making hurriedly for port, and at once it becomes the mark of broadside after broadside of volleys. The first shots tear up the water about the ship, and you feel a sinking emptiness where your heart should be as you realize that it will be but a moment before these vicious shells will find the puny resistance they seek. This slow and helpless vessel trying futilely to get out of range of the racing shells brings vividly to mind the analogous position most of us have known, when, in a dream, we are threatened by some menacing fright, and find our arms impotent to ward it off and our legs powerless to flee from it. The deadly French 75-centimeter gun in action, a giant steel bridge wrecked to prevent the advance of the enemy's troops, the throwing of hand grenades over the short distance that separates the French from the German trenches, a barbed wire entanglement designed to tear to pieces the advancing enemy, a single war missile powerful enough to kill a regiment, a horse hurled by a shell explosion high into a tree-top, the new French aeroplane gun in action trying to bring down an enemy aviator, and the decoration of those who gave their eyes as toll to Mars, are but a few of the vivid scenes that make up this stern film.

ure to be chosen as a member of this squad.

The girls of the school have taken up the Indian club swinging under Mrs. Johnson's directions, and twenty-five pairs of Indian clubs have been provided for their use. The girls have also a choral club, and are studying part singing. They also do regular domestic science work in sewing. At the entertainment given recently for the candidates, the girls made for the boys of the school thirteen uniforms, consisting of jackets, trousers and caps, and few of those who were present would have ever guessed that work of that nature could be turned out by girls in the grades.

The boys have taken up military drill, and have shown a great proficiency in the work. Naturally, at this time, the youth of the country, as well as the city, is more than anxious to feel that he is assisting in the great scheme of preparedness.

The Henley pupils also have an Agricultural Club, and questions they will be required to meet in after years when they are farmers themselves are met with, and they are the better able to deal with them for this schooling. They also have an Industrial Club, and through the instruction of Mr. Sexton are making great progress in this line of work.

Mr. Sexton has taken up another matter in his work in the school that would be a great benefit to many people well past the school age. He has written to each of the large manufacturing firms and through their advertising departments has been favored with displays explaining their processes. All these steps are followed out with minute explanations, and the card also contains samples of the different styles of silk which are found on display in the stores of the country.

Every exhibit is along the same line of explanation and detail, and when a student of the Henley schools calls at one of our local soda fountains for a chocolate malted milk, he knows the ingredients of everything in the drink.

It is evident that Mr. Sexton has been to a great deal of trouble in obtaining these exhibits, but the students assure us that this is but one of the many things their efficient instructors have done willingly for them. The willingness comes, no doubt, from the whole-hearted appreciation which the students show toward their leaders.

Mr. Sexton has promised that whenever a fair, carnival or other enterprise is held in Klamath Falls at which an exhibit place can be arranged, he will place this exhibit before the people, and talk upon it. It is to be hoped that this occasion will present itself soon.

In the meantime, visitors are always welcome at this school, and the same courteous treatment will be accorded them as I received, and I assure you that the time will be well spent in visiting this standard school in District 36.
