German Restaurant Menus Ordered Shorter

LONDON, April 19.—The Imperial German government's order to all German hotel and restaurant keepers that they must reduce the size of meals they serve, both as to variety and quantity, will be effective through out Germany beginning with breakfast tomorrow morning.

The bills of fare will be reduced to the smallest proportions on record, and guests will not be permitted to eat more than one item from any single course—and not very much of that. The butter supply, for instance, now is restricted to one-eighth of a pound per person per week. Mighty little sugar is given. Other food supplies are held to corresponding proportions.

Germany is racing toward famine which has been foreseen since last summer by those who knew the truth about the summer harvest, according to Francis Gribble, the British novelist, who has just returned to London after a year in the German internment camp at Ruhleben, near Berlin.

"There is no avoiding the conclusion," said Gribble today, "that the state of the German people soon will be much what the state of the Belgian people now would be but for American philanthropists."

"The date at which the catastrophe will occur depends upon a good many

uncertain factors; but it cannot long be delayed.

"The 1915 summer harvest, what there was of it, was both sown and reaped while I was behind the barbed wire at Ruhleben. There was practically no rain from the end of March until the beginning of July.

"The crisis passed. Then came the lashing thunder storms to complete the damage. Those of our custodians who were concerned with agriculture pulled long faces and used ugly language. There was no mistake about it—the German harvest of 1915 had failed."

The novelist quoted the Vorwarts, the outspoken German socialist newspaper, to show that the 1915 harvest failed not only on account of drought but because: First—The ground was not manured, the monopolization of railway equipment by the military preventing this. Second—Horses and carts were scarce because of the army needs. Third—Most skilled agriculturists were away at the seat of war, and old men, women, children and prisoners could not do the work. Fourth—The manufacturers of agricultural implements have turned their energies to the manufacture of implements of war.

"Famine is inevitable, whether peace comes soon or not. Prices will be high and the value of German money has sunk so low that twenty marks will buy only five marks' worth of goods; besides, Germany has no great quantities of goods to export and pay for food imports."

SERBIA BEING REBUILT NOW

WORK OF RECONSTRUCTION IS BEING CARRIED ON BY AUSTRIA-HUNGARY—GERMANY IS DOING DIRECTING

ATHENS, April 19.—Germany has begun reconstructing Serbia, Austria-Hungary has charge of the work, but at the top Germans are directing it.

If the people will agree to become Germans—insofar as it is possible to make them over—a point has now been reached where the conquerors evidently are disposed to treat them humanely.

Men are being invited to return to their homes on condition that they cultivate the land in the Austro-Germans' interests. Russian prisoners are being loaned to help them with farm work.

Mills are being refitted with modern machinery, expert engineers have assumed management of the mines, and every effort is being made to find workers in both from the native population.

A similar policy is being adopted in Montenegro. At the same time these industrial and agricultural improvements are in progress, both countries are being practically turned into huge fortifications.

Schools are also being opened. In Belgrade two are running, with a total attendance of about 3,000. Instruction, however, is solely in German. Serbian children are compelled to learn it, whether they wish to or not.

A Resolution declaring the intention of the City of Klamath Falls to improve Eleventh street from Main street to Upham street, exclusive of United States Government Irrigation Canal right of way, and Upham street from its intersection with Eleventh street to Prospect street, directing publication of notice, approving and adopting plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer, determining the boundaries within which the property lies that is benefited and to be assessed for such improvement, and fixing date for hearing objections or remonstrances against such proposed improvement.

Whereas, There has been filed with the Police Judge a petition signed by more than ten freeholders of the city of Klamath Falls whose property will be affected thereby for the improvement, with hard surfaced pavement, of Eleventh street from Main street to Upham street, exclusive of right of way of United States Irrigation Canal, and Upham street from its intersection with Eleventh street to Prospect street, including intersections and

Whereas, The City Engineer, as heretofore required, has filed with the Police Judge his plans, specifications and estimates of cost of more than one variety of the kind of improvement determined upon; and

Whereas, The Common Council has found that said plans, specifications and estimates are satisfactory;

Be It Resolved, That the said plans and specifications and estimates are hereby approved and the Common Council hereby declares its intention to improve the streets above described with bitulithic or other hard surface pavement.

That the plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer covering the proposed improvement are to be used as a basis for said improvement, and any contract for such improvement shall be based thereon and the estimated cost of such improvement as submitted by said Engineer at not exceeding \$19,950.00, is hereby adopted as the probable cost of said work.

Five-a-Week Office Boy Proves a Man in Battle

LONDON, April 19.—There has just reached London the story of a \$5 a week office boy, 15 years old, who died a hero among the bravest of the brave of King George's fleet on Gallipoli peninsula.

It is a story to thrill the heart of every office boy in the United States. This recital of what happened to Cyril Cook after he had left the drab surroundings in the dreary office of a big Pall Mall firm, and hearkened to the order "Charge!" and forgot the lordly over clerk's bumptious summons, "Boy!"

Less than two years ago Cyril Cook was an office boy with a large Pall Mall firm. At the outbreak of war he misrepresented his age to a recruiting sergeant and joined the army. Larry in 1915 his regiment was sent to the Dardanelles.

A letter to the boy's parents in East Finchley tells the story. A comrade detailed how the youngster fought in practically every important engagement.

Twice he surprised his officers by bringing in Turks he had captured at the point of the bayonet.

He had undertaken many dangerous outpost duties, and his conduct throughout all engagements had won

him high praise from the commanders. According to his comrade, the former office boy was in line for decoration. He was killed December 16; shot through the head.
