HURRAH FOR THE YELLOW BOYS

ABOUT the only ships that come into the Pacific Coast harbors these days are the Hokkai Maru and Jijitsu Maru, manned by the yellow boys.

The yellow boys own them, too, and fly the yellow flag of the mikado and carry our lumber to Asia and our flour to Africa and our motor cars to Australia.

These yellow ships, under the yellow flag, manned by yellow crews, do not even respect the longshoremen's union, but loaded 620,000 feet of lumber at Portland in twelve hours the other day.

That would never be permitted under the laws enacted by congress to regulate American shipping of the seven seas, but the yellow program knows not congress.

Well, we Americans ought to be glad that even Japanese ships are allowed to enter our harbors and carry away the manufactured products of our country.

In the meantime, let us pray that some day the American flag will come back and we will not be prohibited by law from carrying our own commerce in our own ships.

THE FACTORY PROBLEM HERE

WE NEED a factory more than anything else at the present time, preferably a factory to consume our meat products.

We ship several carloads of cattle, sheep and hogs from here every week. Then we turn around and ship them back again so we can pay the freight both ways, to make some of our citizens who are out of work pay two prices for meat and shoes. We go to the grocery stores and pay twenty to thirty cents per pound for bacon while we ship it from here at five cents per pound.

Beef products are much the same way. We sell a cow hide for two or three dollars, and then have to pay twenty to get it back.

We ship our wool away, and then we have to pay six or seven times as much for woolen goods as we should. Why? because we do not have a factory here to make it ourselves.

Labor is cheap, for men are in need of employment all the time, and if they do not get it they go away and knock our town. Electricity to run the factory is going to waste here every day.

Why not have a factory and consume some of our own products, and stop to some extent the howl we hear about the "high cost of living"?

The divorce was granted upon Mr. Thaw's charge of infidelity against his wife. Evelyn did not defend the charge, or make any appearance.

A Resolution declaring the intention of the City of Klamath Falls to improve Eleventh street from Main street to Upham street, exclusive of United States Government Irrigation Canal right of way, and Upham street from its intersection with Eleventh street to Prospect street, directing pub-

lication of notice, approving and adopting plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer, determining the boundaries within which the property lies that is benefited and to be assessed for such improvement, and fixing date for hearing objections or remonstrances against such proposed improvement.

Whereas, There has been filed with the Police Judge a petition signed by more than ten freeholders of the city of Klamath Falls whose property will be affected thereby for the improvement, with hard surfaced pavement, of Eleventh street from Main street to Upham street, exclusive of right of way of United States Irrigation Canal, and Upham street from its intersection with Eleventh street to Prospect street, including intersections, and,

Whereas, The City Engineer, as heretofore required, has filed with the Police Judge his plans, specifications and estimates of cost of more than one variety of the kind of improvement determined upon; and,

Whereas, The Common Council has found that said plans, specifications and estimates are satisfactory;

Be It Resolved, That the said plans and specifications and estimates are hereby approved and the Common Council hereby declares its intention to improve the streets above described with bitulithic or other hard surface pavement.

That the plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer covering the proposed improvement are to be used as a basis for said improvement, and any contract for such improvement shall be based thereon and the estimated cost of such improvement as submitted by said Engineer at not exceeding \$19,550.00, is hereby adopted as the probable cost of said work.
