Nearly 3,700 People to Vote at the Primaries

Now that registration books are closed until after the primaries, and all of the precinct registrars have sent in their finished registrations, there are 3,696 people entitled to cast their votes.

Republicans comprise about two-thirds of the total registration. There are 2,411 members of the Grand Old Party eligible to vote at the primaries, while the democratic strength on the register is 1,113 votes.

The rest of the registration is scattered as follows: Progressive, 10; prohibition, 19; socialist, 69; independent, 38; non-partisan, 27; refused to state, 9.

The registration for the ten precincts in Klamath Falls total 1,798, or nearly half of the total registra-

tion. The heaviest registration in the county is in Precinct No. 7, where there are 267 voters registered.

By precincts, the registration follows:

OKLAHOMA CONGRESS MEMBER
WILL MAKE TEST TO SEE IF
FREE SEEDS GETS VOTES OR
LOSES VOTES

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 20.—

To make sure he is not deceiving his constituents, and that he is not being deceived by the agricultural department, as well as to experiment in the production of first class vegetable seed, Congressman Jesse S. Davenport of Oklahoma today donned a pair of blue overalls and hied away across the river to cultivate a seven-acre farm and practice on the government seed crop.

Associated with him in cultivation of the festive soy bean and the gimboling cow pea is J. S. Coffman, an old time employee of the government printing office, who owns the farm.

Possessed of the idea that those numerous packages of seeds which the government sends out at the request of "your congressman" maybe grow turnips instead of early spring radishes, cauliflower instead of frost-proof cabbages, and spinach instead of golden head lettuce, Congressman Davenport has started this practical test within the shadows of the capitol. It might be that they are good vote getters, and again, a constituent expecting to raise a crop of rutabagas surely would be irritated to find parsnips instead.

INTERNATIONAL MULLIGANS NOW

AMERICAN PLANT, WITH PERHAPS ITALIAN EMPLOYEES, IS MAKING IRISH STEW FOR THE BRITISH TROOPS IN FRANCE

EAU CLAIRE, Wis., April 20.—This town's canning factory, beginning today, is being remodeled to turn out 26,000,000 quarts of good old Irish stew at the rate of half a million cans a week, for the Canadian soldiers on the European fronts.

In a few days hundreds of giant kettles with big fires under them will begin to sing their bubbling, boiling song of beef and carrots, beans and corn day and night.

The stew will be packed in cans and shipped via Halifax to Europe.

The contract was awarded by the Canadian government. The first half million cans should be ready by the middle of May.

The waste products of sawmills in the United States, including that fed to furnaces as fuel, is estimated to be 36,000,000 cords per year, and the equivalent of 2,580,000,000 cubic feet of solid wood substance. About half of it has no use whatever, but is usually burned to get rid of it.

The annual losses of livestock in the national forest ranges of the West

due to predatory animals are over \$500,000. An organized campaign is now on to exterminate these animals. Wolves are responsible for about 70 per cent of the cattle losses, while bears cause most of the remainder. Approximately 75 per cent of the sheep losses are due to coyotes, 20 per cent to bears and 5 per cent to lynxes and wildcats. Mountain lions are charged with killing only a few head of cattle and sheep.

Predicts Repudiation of Internal Debt by Kaiser

LONDON, April 1.—(By mail)—Juggling stupendous figures to show that Germany is in desperate financial straits, Edmond Crammond, well-known British statistician, declared here today that the kaiser will seek a gigantic foreign loan at the conclusion of peace.

"This means, in effect," said Crammond, "that Germany will repudiate her internal war debt."

Germany's expenditures to date amount to \$9,595,000,000, while her estimated national wealth in 1913 was about \$75,000,000,000.

Germany's investments abroad amount to \$5,800,000,000, of which about \$750,000,000 have been sold in the United States and the remainder are unrepayable. Germany's colonies are gone; her shipping industry is ruined.

"I do not believe Germany is living and fighting solely on what she is producing. She is living on the fat she has accumulated during the last forty years."

"The decline in the exchange value of the mark and the failures which are taking place among the large banks, despite frantic efforts of the government to keep the 'financial machine' going, point to the approach of the greatest financial debacle the world has ever known."

Turning to the British financial problem, Crammond asserted that a tariff for revenue purposes here is absolutely essential for the "preservation of the balance of our economic system."

He points to Britain's outlay, to date—\$5,920,000,000 including the gross expenditure and the loans to dominion allies and repayments to the bank of England, declaring: "We overcame the financial difficulties of the first eighteen months of war with astounding ease, but the outlook for the coming financial year gives cause for anxiety."

Figuring in the early established "excess profits tax," which he estimates will bring in about \$500,000,000, Crammond says that if the national income for the coming year should only reach a sum as estimated for the year ending March, 1916, the government's financial deficiency at the end of March, 1917, will be about \$4,690,000,000, "which makes a tariff for revenue imperative."

If the war lasts until March 31, 1917, the statistician estimates that the expenditures of the various allied powers approximately will be:

Belgium	2,500,000,000
France	12,500,000,000
Great Britain	13,000,000,000
Italy	2,500,000,000
Russia	12,000,000,000
Servia, Montenegro	500,000,000

As the measure of exacting a penalty on Germany for these expenditures, Crammond suggests that the allies should pool their indemnities and present them in a lump to Germany, also, that each allied power should undertake to impose:

"A war debt export duty on all exports of raw materials to Germanic empires."

"In addition," says Crammond, "the maritime powers should impose supplementary war debt dues on all German and Austrian shipping entering their ports in all parts of the world."

"The proceeds from these duties should be paid over by the allied powers to the 'war debt commission.'"
