JUST COMMON SENSE

If every university and high school in the republic would make arrangements to have military training a part of the regular course for all their male students, beginning with the next term, by the close of next spring's term those students would in the aggregate be a good-sized army, and would be advanced enough to drill a million or two raw recruits in the first duties of soldiers. A Resolution declaring the intention of the City of Klamath Falls to improve Eleventh street from Main street to Upham street, exclusive of United States Government Irrigation Canal right of way, and Upham street from its intersection with Eleventh street to Prospect street, directing publication of notice, approving and adopting plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer, determining the boundaries within which the property lies that is benefited and to be assessed for such improvement, and fixing date for hearing objections or remonstrances against such proposed improvement.

Whereas, There has been filed with the Police Judge a petition signed by more than ten freeholders of the city of Klamath Falls whose property will be affected thereby for the improvement, with hard surfaced pavement, of Eleventh street from Main street to Upham street, exclusive of right of way of United States Irrigation Canal, and Upham street from its intersection with Eleventh street to Prospect street, including intersections and,

Whereas, The City Engineer, as heretofore required, has filed with the Police Judge his plans, specifications and estimates of cost of more than one variety of the kind of improvement determined upon; and,

Whereas, The Common Council has found that said plans, specifications and estimates are satisfactory;
