BOOSTING

WE BELIEVE in boosting. We believe not only in scattering broadcast literature describing the marvelous glory and beauty of our wonderful land or in sending letters back home telling of the good fishing, but also in cleaning up the back yard, keeping trash off the streets, paying the improvement assessment, entering the City Beautiful contest, and in other ways of helping to improve our city. Then we can have something to be proud of, something to boost for; and our boosting will be more effective.

We must boost in a sane, rational, consistent way. What is the use of our raving about the salubrious, exhilarating atmosphere of Klamath Falls when at our very doors we have the Ankeny canal, a thing which is an absolute disgrace to any community, and which is a greater menace to health than anything we can imagine?

Why do we urge farmers to settle here, anyhow? When they do come the townspeople and business men ignore them, and prefer to get their lettuce, beans, peas, celery and cabbage from California instead of from the men who are attracted here by our flowery encomiums. Then the merchants complain because the farmers patronize mail order houses. This is a curious paradox. We are scolding each other for doing a certain thing, and then each man turns around and does the same thing himself. Why do we not stop fussing and get in and work together? We believe in patronizing local business, and we also believe that Klamath products are as good or better than anything which may be produced elsewhere, and that with co-operation between farmers and business men these may be secured at the proper time in the right quantities, and at reasonable prices. Then our money will stay in or around Klamath Falls, and our city will grow not by the efforts of so-called boosters and speculators, but by the earnest work and co-operation of the citizens, which is really the only way a town can grow.

When people come here they are surprised at our lack of civic pride and individual interest in civic matters. Many of us do not care a snap how things turn out, but when a matter is settled, then the kicking begins. Why cannot each man take hold in the beginning, make it his duty to see to it that the right man is elected or the right measure passed, so that all matters will come to a lasting satisfactory conclusion, and everything we tackle will turn out to be a good job.

The enthusiasm manifested in the Shippington road matter is a good indication of the awakening of civic interest. We need more of this, not merely a "hurrah-boys" spirit, but also a willingness and desire to get in and work for the best interests of the city. We must convert the grouch and the kicker, and open the eyes of the professional booster. He may shout about this being the most wonderful city in the West. It is, potentially so, but it remains for us, the citizens of Klamath Falls, to make it really so. The way to do it is to boost, boost with our hands and brains, not merely with our tongues.

RESOLUTION

A Resolution declaring the intention of the City of Klamath Falls to improve Eleventh street from Main street to Upham street, exclusive of United States Government Irrigation Canal right of way, and Upham street from its intersection with Eleventh street to Prospect street, directing publication of notice, approving and adopting plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer, determining the boundaries within which the property lies that is benefited and to be assessed for such improvement, and fixing date for hearing objections or remonstrances against such proposed improvement.

Whereas, There has been filed with the Police Judge a petition signed by more than ten freeholders of the city of Klamath Falls whose property will be affected thereby for the improvement, with hard surfaced pavement, of Eleventh street from Main street to Upham street, exclusive of right of way of United States Irrigation Canal, and Upham street from its intersection with Eleventh street to Prospect street, including intersections and.

Whereas, The City Engineer, as heretofore required, has filed with the Police Judge his plans, specifications and estimates of cost of more than one variety of the kind of improvement determined upon; and.

Whereas, The Common Council has found that said plans, specifications and estimates are satisfactory;

Be it Resolved, That the said plans and specifications and estimates are hereby approved and the Common Council hereby declares its intention to improve the streets above described with bitulithic or other hard surface pavement.

That the plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer covering the proposed improvement are to be used as a basis for said improvement, and any contract for such improvement shall be based thereon and the estimated cost of such improvement as submitted by said Engineer at not exceeding \$19,950.00, is hereby adopted as the probable cost of said work.
