## CONSIDER SHIPPINGTON

THERE have been many strong arguments offered as to why the property owners of Klamath Falls should vote favorably Monday on the measure for the connecting up of the city with the \$50,000 payroll at Shippington and Pelican City. Most of these arguments have been along the line of the benefit that would accrue to the merchants and owners of business and other property in the thickly settled portion of the city.

These arguments are all sound, and should be sufficient to induce any property owner to vote in favor of the city building the Shippington road. But there is another phase of the question which should also be considered.

Shippington and the property through which this road will run is a part of the city of Klamath Falls. These property owners have been paying taxes into the city treasury for years, and will continue to pay taxes for years to come.

They are helping pay for the police and fire service that is used to protect the lives and homes in the business and resident section of the city.

They are paying for street lights for the use of someone else.

They are paying for the construction and keeping in repair of crosswalks and streets in the downtown section, while they are compelled to walk in dust or mud.

They paid their share of the expense of keeping Klamath Falls pavements clear of snow last winter during the heavy storms.

They are being taxed each year to pay for our beautiful \$50,000 city hall, of which we are all so proud.

They are paying their portion of the cost of the many conveniences which make city life attractive, and yet they are receiving absolutely nothing in return.

The property owners of Klamath Falls should ask themselves whether it is fair or just to accept taxes from the people of this district without giving them something in return. These people are not asking for the luxuries which are enjoyed by the people living closer to the business section. They are simply asking that the city build a road to permit them to come into the city to enjoy these pleasures and transact business with the merchants.

If you are honest, and believe in justice and fair treatment, you will vote in favor of the Shippington road at the city election on Monday.

## Little Talks on Health and Hygiene

When Adam first fell into the water the human race took a step forward. Civilization and bath tubs now go hand in hand.

Authorities may vary in discussing the merits of the hot bath, the tepid bath and the cold bath, but they all agree in the abstract that bathing is necessary to good health and a prime promoter of self respect. The removal from the skin of the accumulation of refuse matter is the primary reason for the bath.

It is essential to good health that the skin be kept in proper condition, as it automatically regulates the heat of the body, permitting it to cool off when it becomes too warm, and keeping heat in when it becomes too cold. It assists the lungs and kidneys in the disposal of refuse matter. When the skin sweats it assists the kidneys. When not too heavily clothed, it respires and helps the lungs.

A bath should not be taken too near meal time. There is a normal attraction of the blood toward the stomach after eating; any interference with this and the attraction of the blood toward the surface of the body is apt to arrest digestion.

Warm baths have a soothing effect, and are often prescribed for nervousness. The tepid bath can do no harm. Cold baths are stimulating, but are apt to be injurious if the heart action is not strong enough to permit of a ready reaction. To some individuals the shock to the nervous system is so great that they cannot accustom themselves to cold baths.

Approximately 85 per cent of the losses of cattle on the national forest ranges due to poisonous plants is caused by tall larkspur. Death camas, lupine, laurel, sneeze weed and rubber weed are responsible for sheep losses from such cause, while loco weed is the principal poisonous plant affecting horses. Last year the loss from these causes amounted to about \$300,000.

## RESOLUTION

A Resolution declaring the intention of the City of Klamath Falls to improve Eleventh street from Main street to Upham street, exclusive of United States Government Irrigation Canal right of way, and Upham street from its intersection with Eleventh street to Prospect street, directing publication of notice, approving and adopting plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer, determining the boundaries within which the property lies that is benefited and to be assessed for such improvement, and fixing date for hearing objections or remonstrances against such proposed improvement.

Whereas, There has been filed with the Police Judge a petition signed by more than ten freeholders of the city of Klamath Falls whose property will be affected thereby for the improvement, with hard surfaced pavement, of Eleventh street from Main street to Upham street, exclusive of right of way of United States Irrigation Canal, and Upham street from its intersection with Eleventh street to Prospect street, including intersections, and

Whereas, The City Engineer, as heretofore required, has filed with the Police Judge his plans, specifications and estimates of cost of more than one variety of the kind of improvement determined upon; and

Whereas, The Common Council has found that said plans, specifications and estimates are satisfactory;

Be It Resolved, That the said plans and specifications and estimates are hereby approved and the Common Council hereby declares its intention to improve the streets above described with bitulithic or other hard surface pavement.

That the plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer covering the proposed improvement are to

be used as a basis for said improvement, and any contract for such improvement shall be based thereon and the estimated cost of such improvement as submitted by said Engineer at not exceeding \$19,950.00, is hereby adopted as the probable cost of said work.
