BUSINESS AND POLITICS

SOME day the people of Multnomah county will wake up and realize what fools they have been in permitting a few selfish politicians to influence them in continually changing their state and national representatives. They will then see the wisdom of the people of both Eastern and Western Oregon, with whom business has more weight than politics, and who, as a rule, keep a good man in office at Washington as long as his influence and power for the good of his section continues to grow and expand.

Each term that Congressman Sinnott and Hawley have been returned to Washington their influence has grown until they are able to accomplish the greatest possible good for their districts and can be counted as a credit to the state of Oregon. Unfortunately this has not been the case in Multnomah county. Even this year certain so called republicans in that district are attempting to secure the defeat of Congressman McArthur before he has served his first term, solely to advance personal ambitions and not for the good of the people of the district.

One would think that the people of a district of the importance of Multnomah county, which is vitally interested in so much of the legislation coming before congress, would appreciate the value of having the strongest and most able man they could secure to represent them at the seat of the national government, and would also keep him there at least long enough to get acquainted with the representatives from other states.

During his brief service in Washington, Congressman McArthur has made a strong showing and has already justified the confidence of his friends throughout the entire state in his ability. There is not a section of the state of Oregon but where will be found friends and admirers of "Pat" McArthur, who have faith in his fitness as a legislator, and who rejoiced when he was honored by being sent to Washington. It would be a great loss to the state as well as a disappointment to these many friends if the people of Multnomah county fail to return him to Washington for another term.

KLAMATH NEEDS A PACKING HOUSE

MANY thousand head of cattle, sheep and hogs are shipped from Klamath county each year. At the same time many thousand pounds of cured meat are shipped into Klamath county, and especially Klamath Falls each year.

Does this not, indeed, seem a foolish and unnecessary thing to do? Why should we go to all the unnecessary work and expense of shipping our stock to other markets and let them make the profit, which we should have?

We have no packing house in which to prepare our meats, therefore we are obliged to do this.

Sometimes the farmers complain because the butcher will not buy his beef, but the butcher can have his meat shipped in cheaper than he can cure it himself.

The average butcher does not have the capital to cure and pack his meat in large enough quantities to meet the demand. Klamath county is one of the greatest meat producing sections of Oregon, and could well support a packing house.

A new industry of this sort would help to build up the county, and furnish employment for many men.

He Puts Youths Right on This South American Bug

ST. LOUIS, April 24.—Youth of St. Louis, gazing with eyes of romance and yearning in the general direction of South America has received warning from E. G. Berrien, of Callao, Peru, a business man, that your tropical South American seldom throws away real money and does not gravel his garden walk with butter-colored nuggets. The locale of the tale of King Midas may have been South America, but, Berrien reminds, the neighborhood down there is rather large and the exact scene of the old king's gold-touching had not yet been found.

Berrien's information, received in correspondence here, was timely, for St. Louis being in touch with South America by way of the Mississippi river, romantic stories of fabulous wealth to be acquired by youths of snap and fire had begun to cause vacant chairs at some of this city's family tables. Young men here were said to believe that the approved way of becoming rich in South America was the poker-dice-and-gin-ricky-on-the-verandah method, with natives doing the work in the broiling sun. Of course all Americans down there wore pith helmets and duck suits and had whole companies of native dancers and banjo plunkers working continuously for their entertainment. In fact, the life of the young man down there was very soft.

Berrien has kicked the props from beneath many an air castle. White men have to work in South America, according to his statements and salaries for clerks are not as high as a rule as those prevailing in American cities.

"Young fellows who cannot speak Spanish have scarcely any chance," he said, "and scores of young men are 'down and out,' depending on the

charity of their countrymen. The only way to be sure of a good salary and position is to go to South America under contract to some good American firm."

He added that work and perseverance are just as important as they are in the United States.
