

MUCH INTEREST IN CITY POLLS

BESIDES SHIPPINGTON ROAD AND MAYORALTY QUESTIONS, CITIZENS WILL VOTE ON FIRE APPARATUS PURCHASE

Not in several years has there been so much interest manifested in a city election here, nor has there been such important matters before the people. The race for mayor between the present incumbent, J. B. Mason, and A. J. Lyle and C. B. Crisler is itself a contest that is waxing warmer every hour, with many bets, placed in three different ways.

Police Judge A. L. Leavitt and City Treasurer J. W. Siemens are unopposed. They are both tried-and-proven officials of real efficiency.

All of the citizens will have an opportunity to determine whether the city's fire fighting apparatus is to be brought up to date, as there are two questions on the ballot, one for transferring \$4,510.00 from the city hall fund to the general fund, and the other for purchasing from the general fund fire apparatus. Those favoring advancement should vote "yes" on both questions. The apparatus will not cost near the \$4,510.10, and automobile fire apparatus is sadly needed in Klamath Falls.

The property owners will also vote on the question of improvement of the road to Shippington, with branch roads connecting with Pelican City and Upper Klamath Lake boat landings. The consensus of opinion is that this measure will carry.

The polls open at 9 a. m. and close at 8 p. m. Polling places in each ward are as follows:

First Ward—Bank Exchange building.

Second Ward—New city hall.
Third Ward—Sanderson building.
Fourth Ward—Store next to bath house.
Fifth Ward—Reed building, Fair view.

Firemen Tell of Their Work Here

As outlined brought the department under city control and gave the mayor the right to appoint the officers and members, all we asked was that the officers be chosen from among our members so that we could work in harmony with our officers, and that they, the officers, be capable men with at least two years' local experience.

The fire committee of the council expressed itself as favoring this arrangement and submitted its report to the mayor and council with the understanding that there should be a final meeting of the two committees before the council took final action. The mayor and a majority of the council decided against our arrangements, failed to meet us again, or state their objection to the arrangement we had agreed upon, and as a consequence, when upon April 1 our chief was discharged and we were ordered to disband, there had been no provision made for a new department, and as yet none has been made.

The mayor saw fit to make an appointment of a chief who (contrary to the charter, under which the mayor is working, and which is his guide) has not been a resident of this city for the one year, and is entirely unacquainted with the city.

Now all we ask is a fair deal. We were willing to stick together as a department and serve you to the best of our ability and would gladly do so again if assured fair treatment, and under right conditions. The charge of our having disposed of plumbing fixtures belonging to the city is false. We have receipts and the returned check showing that we paid out of our funds the money for these fixtures, and we therefore had a right to dispose of them.

In conclusion we submit a report of our chief for the term of his service as chief covering a period of five years, which will show what we have done during that time, and we are disappointed to think that the present city officials have been unable to appreciate the value of the services rendered by a body of men who have devoted from four to fourteen years in the service.

We desire to thank the citizens for their loyal support in the past; also Councilmen Sheets and Struble, who used their best efforts in our behalf, and we hope that when you note the loss by fire (as stated in the fire report submitted) in this city during the past five years, you will realize that the loss has been very small, considering the property endangered and the poor equipment we have had to use, and that you will further realize that it does not pay to be without modern equipment and a good, loyal, experienced fire department.

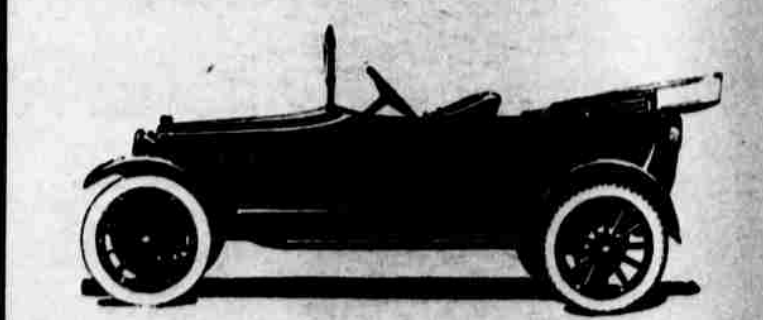
