UTILITY OF BEAUTY

WAS IT Thomas Carlyle who said that no man who once has heartily laughed can be considered wholly depraved, or something to that effect? Shakespeare, in an oft-quoted passage, warns against the man who has no love for music and who seldom smiles. Victor Hugo, John Ruskin, or some other great man with a poetic soul has said that the beautiful is as useful as the useful; and so at least we prosaic, commercial and money-loving Americans are beginning to see the economy and utility of beauty, as well as the value of leisure.

Still, we have far to go before all of us can claim to be far removed from Wordsworth's Peter Bell, of whom it was said: "A primrose by the river's brim a yellow primrose was to him, and it was nothing more." How many of us have the taste for the simple pleasures of life? How many of us still have our childish love for the simple beauties of nature, of flowers, of birds, of trees, of waters, of clouds and of stars? If we have lost that taste and that love, if we have bartered them for something else, have we gained or lost in the exchange?

One of our great men has told us that we ought every day to find time to read, and we ought to learn to enjoy reading a great poem. Somebody has called sculpture "frozen poetry"; how many of us avail ourselves of the opportunities afforded for cultivating the poetical instinct by viewing the great works of art? How many of us adults are in fact practically blind, deaf and almost wholly indifferent to the beauties of the world—all because we were not taught in our youth to love beauty in music, in art and in nature?

A taste for beauty in one realm appears to develop a capacity for appreciating beauty in other realms. The musician must be an artist, and the painter must inevitably be moved by music, as the sculptor is by painting; and all three love Nature in her every aspect. Love and taste for beauty are instinctive in man, and if he loses them through neglect during the period of life they should be encouraged and developed.

ROOSEVELT: PEACE LOVER, AND PEACE KEEPER

HOW MANY times we have heard that almost worn out statement, "If Old Teddy were present today, we'd be in war long time ago," when it was only a few years ago that he was called the great Pacificator. We are at a loss to know how people have obtained the foolish notion, although it has most probably arisen from the fact that Mr. Roosevelt is an aggressive man, and is known as a hard fighter.

But if those persons who make this statement so glibly will only take a little time to look over the history of the two Roosevelt administrations, they may learn a few things that will dispel this false illusion. They will find that during his two administrations he had many fine opportunities to plunge the United States into war. We may mention one or two of the serious disputes that he settled without a hint of war.

The first one centered around the Alaskan boundary. We find that England refused to give up her impossible claims, and that Roosevelt could have forced England to choose between war and diplomatic humiliation. But did he do this? Not at all. Instead, he managed, with fine diplomatic ability, to have the dispute settled by a commission composed of three Americans and three Englishmen, without a drop of blood being shed or any bitter feelings engendered.

Another case is the Venezuelan dispute. England and Germany were preparing to make "temporary acquisitions" of territory in Venezuela in compensation for a debt. This was in direct violation of the Monroe doctrine. Did Roosevelt instantly threaten war, as Cleveland had done? No. Again, with great diplomacy, he managed to have the case settled by The Hague tribunal.

If this does not prove that Mr. Roosevelt is as great a lover of honorable peace as President Wilson, or any other man, we are at a loss to know what it does prove.

We might make further mention of

other facts. It was Roosevelt who proposed the second peace conference at The Hague, and it was Roosevelt who, more than any other man, helped to put an end to the Russo-Japanese war.

Why, then, is the man who was once known as the world's greatest peace maker so sadly misunderstood?

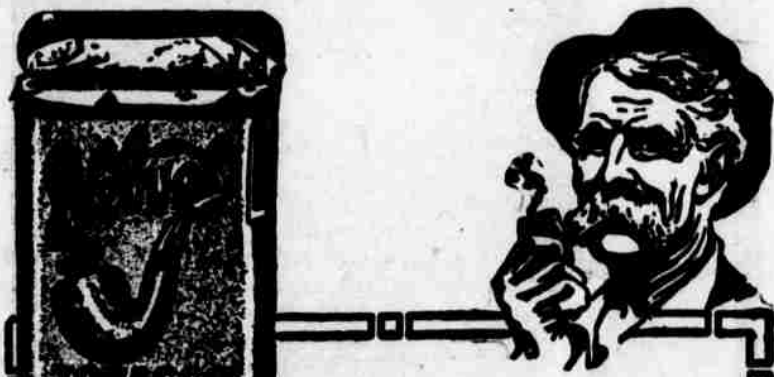
