Crowning of Rose Queen to Be a Beautiful Event

PORTLAND, May 5.—The festival
center of the 1916 Rose Festival, where
the queen is to be crowned the evening
of June 6, will occupy more than 80,
000 square feet in the blocks bounded
by Park, West Park, Salmon and Mad-
ison streets. In addition to the beds

of bloom there will be displays from
sixteen communities of Portland.

The Rose Festival fountain to serve
as the central feature of this vast dis-
play will stand forty feet high, and will
present 16,000 Dorothy Perkins roses.
This will be the first floral feature of
the kind ever built in the United
States.

The Portland Rose Society was or-
ganized more than twenty years ago,
and it is from this society that the idea
of the Rose Festival originated. The
annual rose show will also be a floral
feature of the festival, and more than
1,000,000 choice blooms will be on dis-
play.

When the floral parade moves
through the business streets of the city
this year it is estimated that more than
5,000,000 roses will be on review. It
will require this number to decorate
cars already entered. The horse-
drawn and automobile apparatus of
the Portland fire department alone will
require close to 1,000,000 roses.

Russia's Women Soldiers Not Bothered by Mashers

PETROGRAD, May 5.—The mashers
of Broadway, New York; State street,
Chicago, or Market street, San Fran-
cisco, can take a lesson today from the
front lines of the massive Russian
army. There are women in these front
line ranks—pretty women, fired by
martial patriotism to fight for Russia
or to avenge a fallen father or brother.

Every Russian soldier is a child of
the czar. Every Russian fighting wo-
man is a child of her regiment. And
she is protected as such.

It is against military regulations for
women to be found in Russian regi-
ments. Consequently it has been se-
lected that stories of female fighters fil-
tered back to Petrograd from the fight-
ing fronts. But the heroics of Russian
Amazons are brought to light just the
same.

A Russian soldier has just been dec-

orated with the cross of St. George.
"He" was Vera.

When the Russians took Novosilky,
south of the River Styr, and captured
2,000 prisoners, no soldier wielded a
bayonet more handily than Vera. Every
man of Vera's regiment deserved a
medal, declare the reports, but Vera,
who outwardly looks exactly like any
Russian private, got the cross because
she was a woman.

Vera's comrades agreed that if there
was to be a medal it should go to Vera,
and Vera got it.

From Galicia comes another story of
one of these Russian Amazons. Tanja
Kakourine cut "his" hair short and
joined a Russian regiment because
her mother did the same in the Ruso-
Turkish war of 1877. Tanja is 16. She
is as brave as the best Russian troop-
ers. She has fought in many actions.
She has been recommended for the
cross.

Tanja is pretty. Her round, healthy
face, surmounting a trim military cloak
that sets off her loveliness. She talks
and laughs like a child, and is the idol
of the rough soldier-comrades who pro-
tect her by common accord, and set
toward her as fathers and big brothers.
The soldier who dared touch Tanja un-
kindly would die at the hands of his
regimental companions.
