THE DYE PROBLEM

THE simple, boiled-down fact of the whole dyestuff situation in its relation to the tariff is that owing to the inability of users of dyes and makers of dyes to get together, a rate large enough to encourage the building up of a home industry in dyestuffs has never heretofore been agreed upon.

Now we cannot get dyes on account of the British blockade and we are paying the penalty of our refusal to compromise among ourselves. We now see the necessity of making our own dyes, building up a tremendous industry, employing a large force of labor, and being independent.

Now the value of protection in this industry, at least, has by reason of crushing force of circumstance, impressed the minds of our more intelligent democrats.

Now "American capital and American enterprise are both seriously considering the possibility of entering the field," because there is a general feeling in business circles that the life of the democracy is a short one; that the war will afford ample protection for some months more, and that the republican party will put the industry on its feet in 1917.

DIRECT LEGISLATION IN OREGON

THE following constitutional amendments were referred to the people by the legislature at the coming general election, November 7:

Amend. Sec. 15, Art. V, giving governor power to veto single item in appropriation exemption bills.

Amend. Art. IX on tax exemptions by adding section numbered 1-B extending exemptions.

Amend. Sec. 6, Art. 11, relating to negro and mulatto suffrage restrictions now existing.

Petitions are in circulation proposing initiative measures to be voted on at the same general election:

People's Land and Loan Law, providing that all land rent be collected as public taxes, whether the land is used or not.

This is new form of the sales tax, and is proposed by W. S. U'Ren and State Labor Federation.

Two Sunday legislation bills are being initiated to repeal the antiquated Oregon Sunday law, but one proposes a more drastic law.

It is what is known as the One-Day-of-Rest-in-Seven law promoted by a state Sabbath closing organization headed by Rev. Taft.

The act to repeal and abolish the old Oregon Sunday closing law is proposed by the Independent Retail Grocers Association.

The women of Oregon are initiating a bill to abolish compulsory vaccination and medical treatment, making it optional.

Clackamas County Fishermen's Union initiates a bill barring seines, traps and fishwheels on the Columbia river.

There will probably be some minor measures for county division or removing county seats and possibly ten bills on the ballot.

CRATER FOREST LANDS CLASSIFIED

BIG TRACT OF TIMBER AND SOME FARM LAND IN MT. SCOTT PROJECT, BUT THIS CANNOT BE TILLED, SO ALL IS WITHHELD

Announcement is made today by the district forester, Portland, of the final classification, by the secretary of agriculture, of the lands within the Mt. Scott project on the Crater National forest in Southern Oregon.

This project covers an area of 51,168 acres lying just east of Mt. Scott (elevation 8,938 feet), between Crater Lake National Park and the Klamath Indian Reservation, and is about twenty miles long, by three to five miles wide. The northern boundary of the tract is eighty miles south of Bend, and the southern boundary fifty miles north of Klamath Falls. Kirk, on the Klamath Falls branch of the Southern Pacific railroad, is the nearest railroad point.

It is estimated that the tract contains over 886 million feet of timber, made up largely of western yellow pine. The average stand of all species of 17,000 feet to the acre. The average timber value per acre, it is said, has been estimated at \$55. Part of the area, containing 297 million feet of timber, is now under government timber sale contract at \$3.37 1/2 per M. feet for the yellow pine.

Although much of the topography is favorable to agriculture, the climate and soil conditions are said to be unfavorable. None of the tract is below 5,000 feet altitude, and close to perpetual snows. Hence, killing frosts occur every month, and are liable to occur any night in the year. The soil is pumice and gravel, and it is claimed, cannot be irrigated. Furthermore, the soil is pronounced devoid of organic matter. No similar lands in Oregon have ever been successfully farmed. The region in the vicinity of Sand Creek is known to be very rough. The canyon of this creek, 250 feet deep, is a striking topographic feature of the area and contains the famous "Pinnacles" of the Crater Lake country.

In view, therefore, of the low agricultural value of the area and its high forest value, the secretary has classified the entire tract as chiefly valuable for forest purposes and not subject to homestead entry under the provisions of the acts of June 11, 1906, and August 12, 1912.
