INSTRUCTED DELEGATES

**AS MORE AND MORE** states hold their republican primaries and conventions, the possibilities of stampeding the coming republican national convention to any candidate become more remote.

The number of delegates bearing positive instructions from their various constituencies is now greater than anyone at the start of the campaign supposed it would be. There is now a certainty that 338 of the 985 delegates to the convention will be instructed, so that there is no possibility of stampeding them. This is more than a third of the total number. Many of the remaining delegates, while not legally instructed, nevertheless preserve various allegiances to such an extent that there is little likelihood that they can be stamped in sufficient numbers to nominate anyone.

Moreover, there is a strong possibility that an actual majority of delegates will be instructed, thereby making a stampede an impossibility. In states yet to choose their delegations there are possibilities that 167 delegates will be instructed. These, added to the 338 already instructed, would constitute 505 instructed delegates out of 985 delegates in all.

**GOOD HEALTH CAN BE BOUGHT**

**MONEY** will secure good health. That is, it will insure immunity from certain diseases. Filth breeds sickness as well as crime, and by cleaning up a community sickness can be avoided. Among the diseases which can be prevented is typhoid fever, as it is strictly a filth disease, according to medical experts.

In seeking for a home, if you contemplate moving, always look for a town which is kept clean and tidy, and which has pure water and good sewerage. You will thus insure yourself and family against all filth diseases, and likewise probably save life.

**ARMY AVIATORS NOW HAVE EIGHT BIPLANES**

**COLUMBUS, N. M., May 8.**—Four more Curtiss biplanes of 160 horsepower have arrived here. Eight machines of this type are now in hand, and will be ready for service soon. They are capable of carrying both pilot and observer at a speed of 100 miles an hour in an altitude of 15,000 feet.

The four ninety horse power machines that arrived last week have been set aside as useless for the work in Mexico. Aviators declare that they are not even fit for use as trial machines at the training schools.

# Round Trip Rate Dispute Before Interstate Body

SEATTLE, Wash., May 8.—Do railroad companies discriminate against the Pacific Northwest in round-trip tourist rates from the East? A hearing to decide this important question started here this morning before Examiner Watkins of the Interstate Commerce Commission.

Members of the Public Service Commissions of Oregon and Washington contend that the Northwest is discriminated against. Commissioner Frank J. Miller and Chief Engineer H. E. Hoven of the Oregon commission had several witnesses on hand this morning, to testify that the rates are unfair. Likewise Chairman Charles A. Reynolds and Chief Engineer T. H. Phipps of the Washington railroad commission had witnesses to present testimony before Examiner Watkins.

Unequal rates, it is claimed, keep 90 per cent of the eastern travel out of the Northwest. Commissioner Miller said today that the round trip rate from Chicago to San Francisco is \$17.50 cheaper if the tourist goes by way of New Orleans and Los Angeles than if he goes through the Northwest. And this discrimination exists, said Mr. Miller, despite the fact that the distance by the Northwest route is much shorter.

The Oregon and Washington commissioners have been conferring in Seattle several days, preparing the testimony which they started presenting this morning. Delegations of prominent business men from Washington and Oregon cities were on hand.

The only railroads concerned in the suit, which was brought by the Washington railroad commission, are the Southern Pacific, the Union Pacific and the Oregon-Washington Railroad and Navigation company. Witnesses called by the Northwest commissioners represent every business interest in the different states. Before the hearing concludes, each will be given an opportunity to show just how the differential rate affects the profits of each individual business.

# FINDS ANTIDOTE FOR BICHLORIDE

**SUICIDE'S FAVORITE IS LATEST POISON TO BE SUCCESSFULLY COMBATED — CALCIUM SULPHATE IS REMEDY**

CINCINNATI, May 9.—The discovery of an effective antidote for bichloride of mercury poisoning is announced by Dr. J. H. Wilms, and endorsed by city health officers; and our dependents may now be deprived of their favorite method of committing slow suicide.

The remedy consists of calcium sulphite, given intravenously grain for grain, of the poison taken; one grain of calcium sulphite to one ounce of water within forty-eight hours after the poison has been taken.

# POLLARD STRONG MAN FOR THE POST

**EDITOR OF PRINEVILLE PAPER, WHO IS CANDIDATE FOR DELEGATE TO G. P. O. CONVENTION, GETS ENCOURAGEMENT**

Charles O. Pollard of Prineville is a candidate for election as delegate to the republican national convention, to be held in Chicago in June.

Mr. Pollard is editor of the Prineville News, the oldest paper in Central Oregon, and he has been a resident of this state for several years. He has been a consistent republican all his life, as was his father, who was one of the first members of that party.

Mr. Pollard was for many years connected with important branches of the government, and is a veteran of the Spanish American war. He advocates the nomination of progressive republican candidates for president and vice president, but has pledged himself to support throughout the convention the choice of the people of Oregon as expressed at the primaries, irrespective of his personal preferences.

In voting for Mr. Pollard the people of the Second district can feel sure he will work in the convention for the nomination of the people's choice, whoever he may be. Thus the people have, practically, a direct voice in the convention.

Mr. Pollard is, by the way, Central Oregon's only delegate, and is the only chance for this section to be represented in the convention.
